

## M'CRAY PARDON PLEA SUPPORTED

Special Prosecutor Urges  
Freedom in Letter.

Friends of former Governor Warren T. McCray were encouraged today in attempts to secure his parole from Atlanta Federal Penitentiary by the stand taken by Eph Inman, who sided in the Criminal Court trial of McCray previous to his conviction for using the mails to defraud in Federal Court.

In a letter to President Coolidge, Inman urged a pardon on the grounds that "McCray's punishment already is more than ample."

Inman represented to the President that this was the general feeling of Hoosiers.

Inman was appointed special assistant prosecutor by Criminal Court in McCray's trial of the charge of embezzling \$150,000 of State board of agriculture funds. The jury disagreed.



## HOME BUILDING IS TREND NOW

Survey Shows Fewer Apartments.

CHICAGO, April 3.—Building operations in the Nation's large cities indicate a drift from apartment buildings to moderate priced homes in the suburbs, according to a survey made public by the Indiana Limestone Quarrymen's Association.

The survey, which was conducted on a Nation-wide scale, also revealed the fact that building in the United States during the first three months of 1926 totaled \$1,500,000,000 as compared with \$1,240,000,000 for the same period last year.

New York City leads the Nation's cities in building. The other cities follow in the order named: Chicago, Detroit, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Atlanta, San Francisco, St. Louis, Boston, Cleveland, Indianapolis, Seattle, New Orleans, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Dallas, Milwaukee, Kansas City, Minneapolis and Buffalo.
