APPLE BUTTER CAKE

One-half cup sugar, one tablespoon butter, two eggs, one cup raisins, one cup apple butter, one teaspoon lemon extract, two cups flour, two teaspoons baking powder. Cream butter and sugar, add eggs well beaten and flavoring. Then add the apple butter, raisins and flour. Just before the cake goes into oven add baking powder and beat well. Bake in a moderate oven.
