

SHELBY COUNTY MAN ON TRIAL

Jury Will Hear Habitual Criminal Charge.

Walter Snapp of Shelbyville, charged with being a habitual criminal, went on trial in Criminal Court today before a jury which will determine whether he will be imprisoned for life. Snapp was granted a change of venue from Shelby County Circuit Court after he was arrested March 13 on an affidavit sworn by Joseph N. Kirk of Shelbyville charging Snapp with unlawful possession and use of a still and being a habitual criminal.

If Prosecutor William H. Remy succeeds in convicting Snapp of having unlawful possession of a still, under the Indiana statutes Snapp can be imprisoned for life, since that will make the third felony for which he has been convicted, it is said.

Remy said he would prosecute the case as vigorously as if it originated in Marion County.

LIGHT ASKED ON INDIANA OIL BUY

Walsh Names Standard in Trust Inquiry.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Investigation of the acquisition by Standard Oil Company of Indiana of the Pan American Petroleum and Transport Company is asked in resolution introduced by Senator Walsh of Montana, along with investigation of mergers in other big industries. The resolution was referred to the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee of which Senator Walsh

son of Indiana is chairman. Walsh pointed out that business newspapers say the merger will make the Standard of Indiana one of the largest producers and marketers of fuel oil in the world.

The resolution cites a dozen recent like mergers in various basic industries, and ask the Federal Trade Commission to report if they are in violation of law, if they create monopolies in the respective fields, and what new legislation is needed to control them.

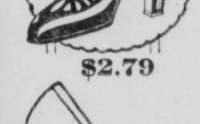

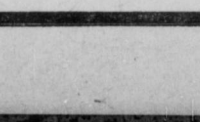
