A harpist, a soprano soloist, a
novelty entertainer and a red hot
jazz orchestra, will be heard on The
Indianapolis Times radio program

beginning at 8:30, Friday night.

Miss Ruth Hutchins, harpist, will
give several harp solos. Since the
harpists from St. Mary-of-the-
Woods appeared on The Times pro-
gram several weeks ago there have
been many requests for harp num-
bers.

Miss Hutchins is one of the best
known of the younger harpists in
the city. Miss Sylvia Tschudi, sop-
rano, who appeared several
weeks ago on a Times program, has
consented to appear again. Many

An artist new to radio patrons of
The Times will be introduced
Friday night by Carl Fohl, Times
announcer. He is George W. Near,
known as the whistling back-
man of the Indianapolis Division of
the Pennsylvania Railroad. He is in
demand most of the time, because
