

GAS PRICE GIVEN ONE CENT BOOST

Independent Hoosier Dealers
Follow Standard's Lead.

Gasoline and kerosene prices advanced in Indiana today. It was estimated that the increases will cost Hoosier motorists upwards of \$25,000 a month.

Standard Oil Company directors in Chicago Wednesday increased the price of gasoline 1 cent a gallon and that of kerosene one-half cent a gallon. Most independent dealers followed the lead of Standard Oil stations, charging 23.2 cents a gallon for low test gas and 26.2 cents for high test.

The increase will yield oil companies one-third as much as the State realized in gasoline taxes on a 3-cent a gallon levy. In March, before the spring motoring season really opened, the State collected \$604,469.68 in gas taxes and returns are expected to be much higher with the advent of summer.
