## NEW FRANKLIN HEAD IS SOUGHT

Franklin College trustees today were considering a successor to Dr. Charles E. Goodell, president of the institution for nine years, who resigned late Monday as a protest against college dominance by the Indiana Baptist convention, governing body of the Baptist denomination in the State.

In his letter of resignation, Goodell revealed friction between the college and the convention has existed for nearly three years and that as a result his burden "has been almost too heavy at times for human endurance."

The resignation was accepted, effective July 1. He was voted an extra year's salary.
