SPEEDWAY BOOZE FLOW IS CHECKED

110 Gallons of Whisky Seized by Deputies.

Flow of 110 gallons of white male whisky, said to have been brought here for the Speedway race May 21, was suddenly stopped at 4:30 a. m. today by Deputy Sheriffs Bell and Brown. They arrested Charles Jones, 19, of 8101 S. Meridian St., and Newland McElfresh, 28, New Jersey and South Sts., as they were driving into Indianapolis from Chicago. They said they discovered the whisky, in five and one-gallon cans, covered with sacks, in the rear of a touring car in which the two men were riding. The men, charged with transporting liquor, said they bought the booze at Chicago Heights and were bringing it here for the races. They refused to disclose to whom it was to be delivered. Jones started the machine belonged to his employer. The defendants were held to the Marion County grand jury by Municipal Judge Dan V. White. Bond was fixed at \$2,000 each.

NEW CABINET MEETS Marx Plans to Avoid Crisis Over Uniform Flag.

By United Press. BERLIN, May 17.—The new ministry, headed by Chancellor Marx, today discussed its impending declaration of policy to the Reichstag. The government was formed after the week-end to succeed that headed by Hans Luther, which fell early last week. It was agreed to create immediately a uniform German flag, settling the question which, to the fall of the Luther government, in a manner designed to eliminate friction between the Republicans and the monarchists.

(Continued From Page 1) clared. "I know who's back of this. It's done just to embarrass me." Another Implicated Mrs. Reese's charges also implicated Mrs. William Decker, 2144 Massachusetts Ave., divorced recently from young Reese's uncle. Mrs. Decker and Hamrick conspired to force the lad into prison and then "bleed" his mother for fees, sharing the proceeds equally between them, Mrs. Reese charged in her affidavit. Mrs. Decker, also subpoenaed, according to the board, failed to appear. Pardon board meantime intimated that contempt proceedings might be started. Denial Made Denial was made on behalf of Mrs. Decker. Mrs. Reese said she had paid out nearly \$1,500, including a \$915 cash payment to Hamrick, before she learned the latter had "double-crossed" her by "pretending" to be her attorney. William Decker, the boy's uncle, testified to essentially the same facts. He said his wife, through Hamrick, had applied for a divorce. He said Mrs. Decker had wanted \$50 a month for support and, failing to receive this, had tried to wreck her spite on the boy. Affidavits Presented Affidavits were presented to the board charging Hamrick with denying the boy the privilege of testifying in his own behalf when on trial. On advice of Hamrick, young Reese told reformatory officials he had committed the deed, when in reality he had taken only a suit case of old clothes, Reese's mother said. A letter from Mrs. Decker to the board was read in which she branded the youth "a stick-up man and an outwager of young women." Petitions for clemency were read from Criminal Judge James A. Collins and Prosecutor William H. Remy. Reformatory Superintendent A. F. Miles and the boy's instructor at the institution, characterized him as "reformed" and a promising youth. Several relatives of the youth testified as to his good character. He has an opportunity to play baseball in the Three-Eye League at \$250 a month, his mother told the board. ATTORNEY SILENT ON LEAGUE PLEA

Prepares Reply for Trio in Contempt Case.

"I would rather not name the baby before it is born," Attorney James Bingham, 1005 Fletcher Savings and Trust Bldg., said today of the pleading he is preparing for Tuesday in the Supreme Court contempt case of Superintendent E. S. Shumaker of the Anti-Saloon League and Ethian A. Miles and Jess E. Martin, league attorneys. Bingham represents the trio. The court Thursday required the trio to respond to a twenty-page amended bill of information, alleging contempt, which was filed by Attorney General Arthur L. Gilliom. Gilliom's amended bill charged that Shumaker's annual report to league trustees shows a "clear purpose" of the defendants to control liquor case decisions of the court; that the report "deliberately, maliciously and falsely" stated in effect that the "liquor interests" control the court, which constitutes contempt. Plans for official dedication of the Indianapolis airport, which is to be created following removal of the 113th Observation Squadron of the Indiana National Guard from Kokomo to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway were laid today at a meeting of the airport committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Complete reorganization of the guard squadron, with a full peacetime strength of 157 men and thirty-three officers, will be the first step, according to instructions received by Capt. Richard F. Taylor, recruiting officer, from Adj. Gen. William H. Kerehner. The new squadron, with a \$50,000 annual pay roll, will include a medical detachment of one captain and five enlisted men and a photographic unit of one lieutenant and thirty-two men. There will be approximately thirty flying officers in the unit. Recruiting begins Tuesday at 24 E. Michigan St.
