Three families were forced to flee from their homes late Thursday when fire caused considerable damage to three houses in the 1200 block in Maderia St.

Blaze which is said to be the work of a pyromaniac started in the home of J. McDoan, Negro, 1212 Maderia St., where \$1,000 damage was done. Fire communicated to the home of Stark Brooker, Negro, 1210 Maderia St., causing a \$900 damage. Loss of \$900 was suffered when fire spread to the home of Miss Alice Helm, Negro, 1214 Maderia St.

Firemen from Engine Houses 3 and 15 and Squad 2 said they thought the fire was of incendiary origin.

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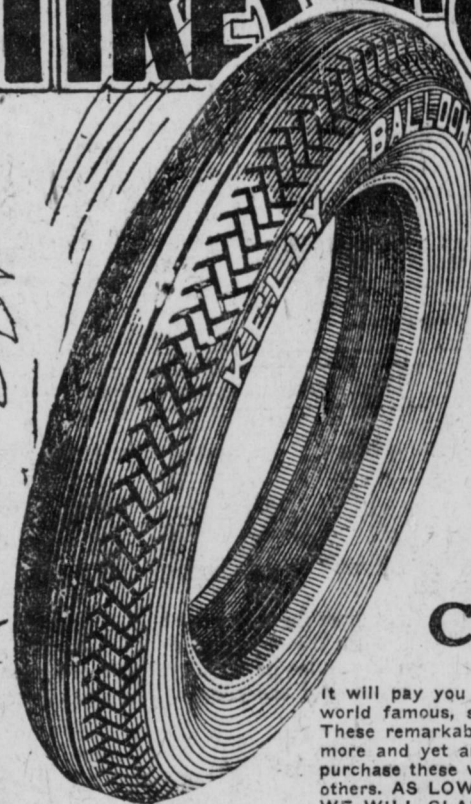
