

## ANOTHER BARRETT SUIT CONSIDERED

More Favorable Decision Is Hoped For.

Filing of a suit is one of the Marion County Superior Courts to prevent County Treasurer Edward A. Ramsay from pocketing interest on Barrett law prepayments is being considered today by persons interested in the Barrett case. More money than President Coolidge. ## FIRE MARSHAL REPORTS

Having done so, the two again confronted the clerk, hoping to be issued a license. But Mrs. Carter balked, although the application was properly filled out. The prospective groom gave his age as 21, and the bride 19.

But Mrs. Carter doubted their ages. Although they were of the

proper age to obtain a license, Mrs. Carter said she believed they were several years younger.

"You'll have to bring your parents in to swear to your age, because I think you are both younger," said Mrs. Carter. The couple appeared speechless. They looked at each other, then at the clerk, and left the room as slyly as they entered. It was disclosed the youth's parents are visiting in Florida and the young woman's mother lives in Noblesville, Ind., and her father in Chicago.
