## VETERANS OF CIVIL WAR TO RECEIVE PENSION BOOST

Uncle Sam Adds \$15,000,000 to Payments Given Soldiers.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Christ-  
mas comes Aug. 4 this year for 56,000  
veterans of the Civil War and 20,000  
widows of veterans.*

On that date pension increases granted by the last Congress become effective and Uncle Sam adds about \$15,000,000 to the \$200,000,000 pension bill he pays annually.

Veterans who have been getting \$50 a month are to receive \$65 hereafter, and those who are totally helpless and blind will receive \$90.

### War Widows Paid

Widows, who were married to soldiers during the time of their service in the Civil War, will receive \$50, instead of the \$30 they have been getting.

Widows of soldiers of the war of 1812 and the Mexican War, and Army nurses, will be raised from \$30 to \$50.

Congress attempted to enact a pension bill giving increases that would have cost twice as much, but the bill failed of passage until it was put into its present forms.

By the time the seventieth Congress convives the number of pensioners on the rolls will be smaller, and larger pensions will probably be given to those classes which have not benefited by this measure.

Meanwhile, the short session of Congress, a bill to increase veterans and widows of the Indian wars will probably be enacted. Indian war veterans get only \$20 a month from the Government and their widows \$12.

There were 512,213 pensioners on the Government rolls April 1, and the number is decreasing at the rate of about 2,000 a month. Civil War Veterans still number 112,362. There are almost twice as many widows pensioned. Their ages range all the way up to 94 years and more than half the widows are over 75 years.

Here for his vacation among the Adirondack lakes and woods, he had a set time to fish, a time to walk, a time to sleep, and to eat.

He goes about his play deliberately, just as in Washington he goes deliberately about the receiving of callers, signing of bills or conferring with his Cabinet.

### The Schedule

Here is his vacation schedule for a full day:

7 A. M.—Awakens.  
7:30 A. M.—Breakfast.  
8:30 A. M.—Goes fishing.

11 A. M.—Returns from fishing and reads mail, dictates letters and confers with staff.

1 P. M.—Lunch. After lunch he takes a nap.

3 P. M.—Awakens and goes fishing once more.

5 P. M.—Returns from fishing and walks around the grounds of his camp.

7 P. M.—Dinner. After dinner he reads, plays with the dogs and chats with Mrs. Coolidge.

10:30 P. M.—Retires to bed.

### What He Wears

He dresses appropriately for every occasion. When fishing he wears a pair of raw hide oats, a rough suit with rough riding breeches and an old felt hat; with his fishing badge given him by Governor Al Smith of New York, displayed on the crown.

Walking, he displays a like costume. Before dinner he changes to a lounge suit, the kind he always wears in Washington.

On rainy days, or on days when rain is expected he carries a worn black slicker. When the sun is particularly warm he often wears an old leghorn hat, with its rim pulled down all the way around.

Mrs. Coolidge on the other hand, wears much the same clothes she wears in Washington. She is usually dressed in a light frock, which she wears all day. When she goes walking, generally once a day, she wears often a pair of boots similar in type to those worn by her husband. On several occasions, however, she has worn pumps while walking. Recently she was caught in a rain wearing pumps and returned to the master cabin with wet feet.
