

COOLIDGE TO BE IGNORED IN FALL STATE CAMPAIGN

Watson Glories at Record Achieved in Bucking President.

The Republican senatorial and State campaigns this fall will be conducted independently of the record of President Coolidge. It was clearly demonstrated at the G. O. P. State gathering at Turkey Run State Park, Wednesday.

Although there were a few words of faint praise for the Republican President, the oratorical point-with-prides and other time-honored flourishes for the current Republican chief executive were conspicuous by their absence.

"Coolidge Remarkable"

"Calvin Coolidge is a remarkable President," was about the best Senator James E. Watson, rendered for ability to distribute compliments gracefully, could produce. Senator Arthur R. Robinson and Governor Jackson could do little better.

Watson deliberately outlined his differences with Coolidge, particularly on the farm relief question and in so doing proclaimed himself the leader of the anti-administration forces.

"The President kept me from getting my way and I kept him from getting his," Watson boasted.

Coolidge forced in killing the Hauen farm measure and to the failure of the Fess bill, the Administration measure, to be adopted.

"We have had our differences on the world court and the method of providing relief for the farmer, but there has been no estrangement between myself and the President," Watson added.

Worthy of Steel

Watson warned the thousand Republican workers that they should concentrate efforts in the rural districts, where he said the Democrats expect much support.

"The Democratic morale has not been in better shape for eight years; let us remember we have an enemy worthy of our steel," Watson said.

"But the fight the Indiana delegation carried on for the agricultural

bill the farmers wanted entitles us to their support."

The frigidity of the general attitude toward Coolidge was enhanced by the frank report of Lloyd Gates, Columbia City, Twelfth district chairman, which preceded by several hours the senatorial oratory.

"There's a lot denying the fact that the farmers are antagonistic to the Administration," Gates reported. He added, that he did not believe the antagonism extended to the Indiana delegation in Congress.

Park Employee Dies While Adjusting Pool Electric Lights.

A verdict of heart attack was given by Coroner Paul F. Robinson today as the cause of death of Fred Kempf, 28, of 1014 S. Keystone Ave., Wednesday night at Riverdale Park.

According to J. W. Darter, 1809 W. Thirty-First St., and J. M. Black, 530 S. East St., park employees, Kempf was adjusting an electric light in the fish pool when he plunged into the water. He was dead before medical attention could be given. C. A. Coulter, manager and a brother-in-law of Kempf, said he had been suffering from heart attacks.
