

PROTEST AGAINST SHUMAKER PAPERS

Attorney General and Aids File New Brief.

Attorney General Arthur L. Gillich and Solon J. Carter and William H. Thompson, who are assisting in the contempt proceedings against E. S. Shumaker, Indiana Anti-Saloon League Superintendent, Wednesday filed strenuous protest against the acceptance by the court of the last two documents filed by attorneys for the defendant.

The brief filed by Gillich sets out that the issues in the case have been closed and that the papers filed by the Shumaker attorneys do not raise a new issue and are only a reiteration of previous papers. The brief protests against their acceptance for the reason that it would only further encumber the court records.

In the brief, attorneys for the State say that they will file the State's final brief as soon as possible.

—Negro Lad Also Drowns.

Even though God gave her nine healthy youngsters besides "Jim," Mrs. Andrew Linder, 1619 Wilcox St., could not reconcile herself today to the idea that she could "spare" James, 15.

Police dragged from White River late Wednesday the water-logged body of "Jim," the season's fourth victim of drowning in the county. The undertaker brought him home this morning. He was the second boy to drown Wednesday.

"Couldn't Spare Jim"

Around the hysterically grief-stricken mother, usually calm and reserved, being of Kentucky mountain stock, gathered James' five brothers and four sisters.

"If all the children in the world were mine," she said, "I couldn't spare Jim."

The presence of Lawrence, Clarence, Roy, Mitchell, Jewett, Lena, Viola, Irene and Pearl was no consolation.

Burial in Kentucky

Plans were being made to take the body to the family's old home in Hardin County, Kentucky, for burial. James drowned about 400 yards east of his home and three blocks north of the W. Michigan St. bridge. He had ventured to the middle of the river in a boat with a playmate, Oda Martin, 15, of 1618 Wilcox St. The boat capsized. The companion swam to safety. A brother of the boy who escaped, Calvin Martin, 14, had been with the lads a short time before.

Earlier in the day, using grappling hooks, police recovered the body of Stanley Morris, 11, Negro, of 910 S. Pennsylvania St., who drowned swimming in the Canal near West St.

THREE DROWN IN RIVER

Evanston Youth Dies Trying to Save Two Girls.

Blackburn drowned trying to save the girls, who had stepped into deep holes.

FAVORS CIVIL SERVICE

C. C. Officers to Aid in Getting Mayor's Plan Under Way.

Acting on Mayor Duval's announcement that he would install civil service for police and fire departments, the Chamber of Commerce has offered to aid in establishing the operating machinery.
