

HORN BLOWING IN TRAFFIC OF CITY ASSAILED

Motor Club Asks Citizens to
Report Unnecessary
Noise.

Too much noise on the city streets is branded as a nuisance by Todd Stoops, secretary manager of the Hoosier Motor Club, who says that many motorists are depending upon their horns to blow traffic out of a jam.

"When a driver arrives at a traffic jam," says Stoops, "it may be safely assumed that the motorist at the head of the jam will move as soon as he is able and no amount of horn blowing will dislodge him until the obstacle is removed."

"The typical horn blower is silent as long as a traffic officer is in sight, but when the traffic officer is absent the noisy motorist is most active with his horn."

"Many new signs have been erected recently by the Hoosier Motor Club to guard the patients in hospitals from the impatience of the horn blower. These signs have a red cross on a white background and stand out prominently, but they seem to have little effect on the important motorist, who thinks he can pass any barrier by the use of his horn."

"The Hoosier Motor Club would welcome reports from citizens, who have been annoyed by unnecessary horn noises and this report should not fail to give the license number of the car, the location of the car, the date, and the time. Motorists, who blow their horns in preference to ringing the door bell and those who try to blow traffic out of a jam contribute the two classes of horn blowers, who cause most of the disturbance and the club would especially welcome reports of them."

MURDER TRIAL DELAYED

Widow of Slain Man Faints On Witness Stand.

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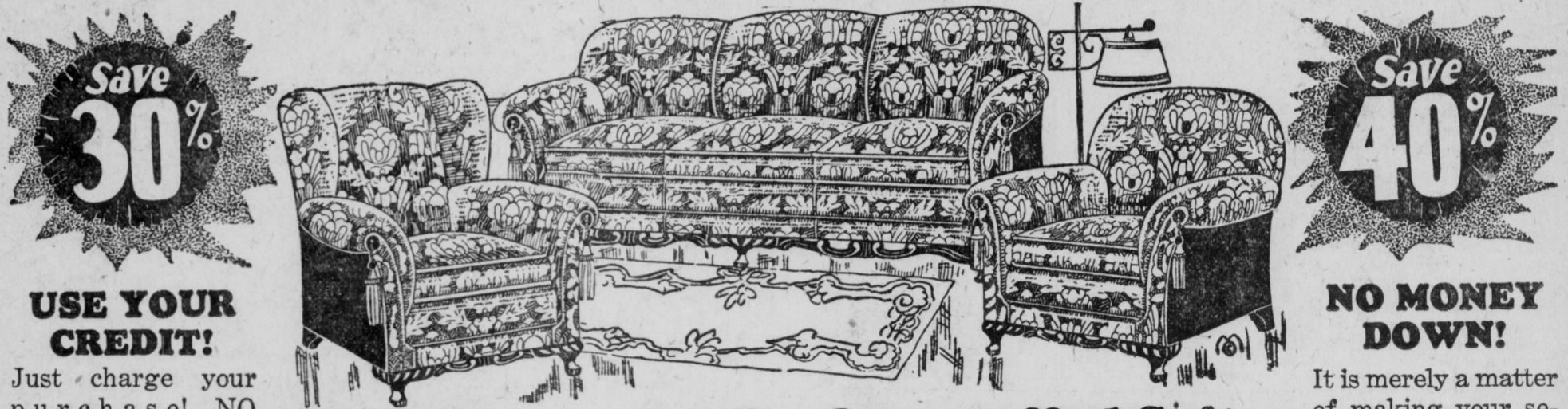
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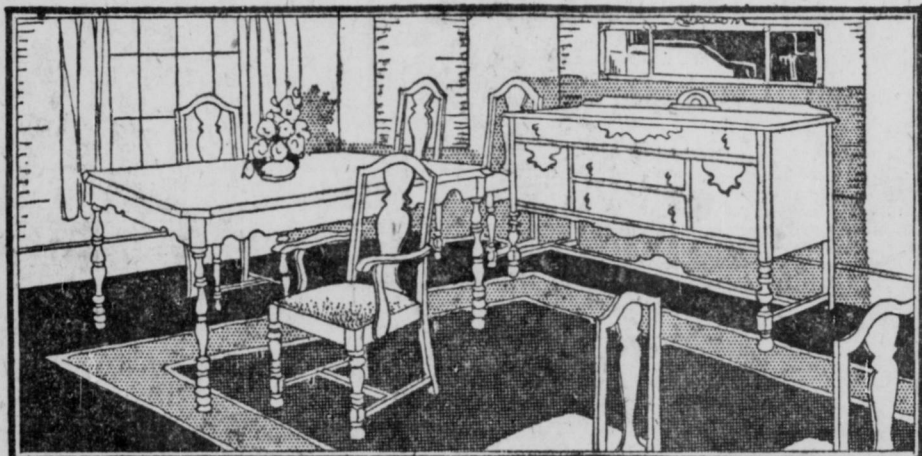
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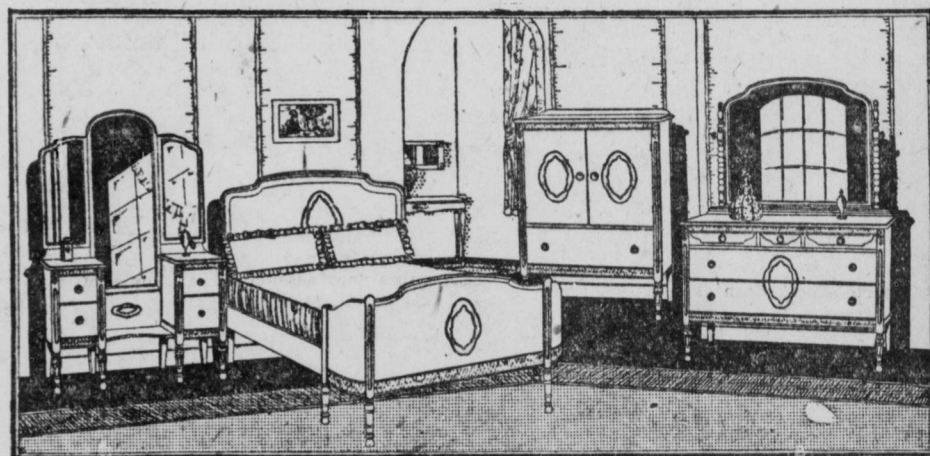


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
