

DRY NAVY PLANS NEW OFFENSIVE AGAINST BOOZE

Court Holds American Ships
Carrying Liquor May Be
Seized Anywhere.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—The coast guard today prepared to launch a new offensive against rum runners as a result of a recent United States Circuit Court of Appeals decision that American ships are under jurisdiction of the United States laws anywhere in the world.

With this new powerful ruling and broader authority to enter British waters as provided in the anti-smuggling agreement perfected by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews, with English officials, the dry navy is expected to expend its activities into the very havens of the liquor smugglers.

Handicapped Before

Government patrol boats have been scouring the Atlantic and Pacific waters for footloose convicts as far out as 100 miles, but unless the liquor ships came within twelve miles of shore they were not molested. Now, with the court ruling and the British agreement, all boats carrying the American flag and found operating illegally will be seized.

Attorney General Sargent confirmed the court ruling, pointing out that "the laws of the land follow the flag."

Enforces Twelve-Mile Law

The Coast Guard also will resume its policy of seizing rum boats flying foreign flags caught within the twelve-mile limit. After a court de-

clison freeing a vessel of foreign registry captured twelve miles from shore and a ruling that the territorial waters of America extended only three miles from shore, the dry Navy curtailed its activities. Now, with the Circuit Court of appeals and the Justice Department strongly behind it, the Guard plans to establish a "dead line" twelve miles from shore on all foreign liquor boats.

Where American citizens are found engaged in rum smuggling under a foreign flag, the guard will report to the State Department and protests will be filed with the nation under the registry of which the bootlegger is operating.

HUMIDITY STAYS HIGH

But Not So High as It Was Monday—Fair Weather Predicted.

High humidity, which kept Indianapolis uncomfortable Monday despite a temperature of about normal, was present again today, though not to such a pronounced degree. At 7 a. m. the humidity, relative amount of moisture in the air, was 88 per cent of possible saturation, while Monday at the same hour it was 94.

Generally fair weather tonight and Wednesday, with little change in temperature, was predicted.

STATES FAIL TO REACH AGREEMENT

Arrests of Indiana, Kentucky
Truckers Continues.

Attempts by Secretary of State Frederick E. Schortemeier to reach an agreement with Kentucky authorities in regard to unrestrained interstate automobile traffic, have so far been unavailing, it was announced today.

S. R. Glenn of the Kentucky tax board has telegraphed Schortemeier that authorities of his State would continue to enforce a new law requiring all commercial vehicles coming into the State to display Kentucky license plates. Indiana truckers are being arrested in Henderson, McLain and Davies Counties under the new law. Ollie P. Wright, securities commission investigator, was sent to Evansville to take charge.

Arrests by Indiana State police of drivers of commercial vehicles bearing Kentucky licenses continue, the total being more than forty. Schortemeier said only drivers of commercial vehicles would be arrested, though under the law all could be taken into custody. Those arrested are compelled to buy Indiana licenses.

The couple was sitting in Elk's automobile parked in a farm yard near Chillicothe, when another car drew along side. Its occupant fired a volley of shots and drove away. A farmer found the woman and boy dead.

Mrs. King separated from her husband, had been seen in the company of Ross, a married man.

POLLARD FOUND GUILTY

Jury Recommends Life Imprisonment for Murder

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Aug. 3.—Henry Pollard today faced a life sentence for the fatal shooting of John Thomas, May 30, when a jury here found him guilty of first degree murder.

Thomas was killed in a quarrel with Pollard and a strong defense plea had been advanced which many believed would cause the jury to disagree.

After but three hours of deliberation the jury returned a verdict of guilty and recommended life imprisonment. Judge Morrison is expected to pass the sentence today.
