

INQUIRY BARES POWERS BEHIND CHICAGO THRONE

Crowe-Barrett G. O. P. and
Brennan Democrats Con-
trol City and County.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—In Chicago as
in most big cities there is an un-
written relation between business,
crime and politics. While the Reed
senatorial committee is showing up
the relation between politics and
public utilities, a special grand jury
is investigating crime and ballot-box
stuffing.

The big contributors to the Smith
senatorial campaign fund and the
campaign for county offices of the
Crowe-Barrett Republican organiza-
tion were representatives of big busi-
ness. Every business that can be
affected by city, county and State
officials has to pay a politics tax to
the organizations controlling the
public office. Often they as Sam
Insull admits he did—contribute to
all of the contending factions.

No More Loyalty
Contributions are rarely if ever
made because of the weak loyalty to
a political party. Insull's contribu-
tions were made to Smith who is
Republican and dry as well as to
Brennan who is Democratic and wet.
Also to the Crowe-Barrett organiza-
tion which is Republican and wet.
Working together harmoniously the
Crowe-Barrett, Republican organ-
ization and the Brennan Demo-
cratic organization control both the
city and county administrations.
This includes the city council of Chi-
cago, the board of commissioners of
Cook county, the police department,
the sheriff's office, the State's at-
torney's office, and they the local

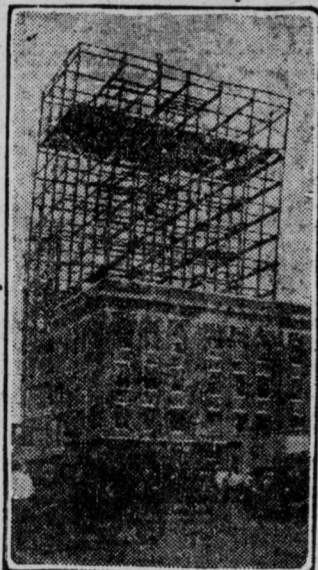

of the various courts are known as
Crowe-Barrett judges, Brennan
judges or Deenen-Lundin judges.

There are some good judges and
some bad ones, but all of them have
to be factional politicians or they
can't be nominated. Unless they are
nominated they can't be elected.
Judge Robert Crowe is head of the
Crowe-Barrett organization and is
also State's attorney. He has about
fifty lawyers as assistants and also
his own detective force.

Controls Indictments
He practically controls all grand
jury indictments and conducts all
criminal trials not Federal in their
nature. The Brennan Democratic
organization controls the mayor's
office and the police force. Brennan
selected Mayor Deever's secretary to
represent the organization.

Crowe, Barrett and Brennan con-
trol the tax board of review, the
board of county commissioners and
the sanitary district trustees. The
findings of the board of review are
final as to the valuation of property
for taxation.

Can Lower Taxes
Large taxpayers consider that
board as very important as it can
raise or lower the amount of taxes
they pay. If they want to get tax
favors they can't well refuse to con-
tribute to the campaign funds of
the organization that control the
assessors and the board of review.

Probably it is a business necessity
for operators of public utilities to
contribute liberally to both the Re-
publican and Democratic organiza-
tions. Probably it is also a busi-
ness necessity for bootleggers and
all other law violators of the under-
world to contribute liberally to the
political organizations which con-
trol the police force, the sheriff's of-
fice and the State's attorney's office.
Nobody believes that half the
truth has been told about all cam-
paign contributions for the Illinois
primary and where the money came
from. The public utilities and some
big business men got into the lime-
light but the criminal underworld was
kept under cover.

NEW ARSENAL SYSTEM

Will Be Far From Center of Popu-
lation, Plan.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Reorgani-
zation of the United States' pow-
der storage system through creation
of two arsenals, each covering 100
square miles of territory, far from
centers of population and well-pro-
tected from possible air attacks, is
almost a certainty, Navy officials
said today.

damage, probably will be approved
without delay this winter, it is gen-
erally believed.
