

WASHINGTON IS INTERESTED IN OHIO'S PRIMARY

Willis and Pomerene Expected to Be Victors in Vote Today.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.— Senatorial primaries will be held in three States tomorrow, Alabama, Arkansas and Ohio, but Washington is watching Ohio.

Outcome of the Buckeye primary may influence political history for the next few years, some politicians think.

Former Senator Atlee B. Pomerene, is a candidate for the Democratic nomination and Senator Frank B. Willis is seeking Republican endorsement for a second term. Willis will win easily and Pomerene probably will defeat his chief opponent, Miss Florence Allen, a member of the Ohio Supreme Court.

The Republican and Democratic organization will exert every influence in behalf of Willis and Pomerene. The prohibition question is sure to be involved. Willis has been closely associated with the Anti-Saloon League. He has acquired "honorary" for speeches under its auspices. Pomerene voted against the Volstead Law. If he is elected it is expected he will support moderation legislation.

Willis voted to seat Newberry and was the author of an apologetic resolution adopted by the Senate when Newberry was seated. Pomerene led the fight to seat Newberry.

Pomerene's candidacy will be watched also because of the possibility that he may be a contestant for the Democratic presidential nomination should he defeat Willis.

Alabama will choose a successor to Senator Oscar Underwood, who is retiring, and Arkansas will nominate Senator T. H. Caraway to succeed himself. Each of these nominations is equivalent to election.

BOARD TO GET SCHOOL PLANS

Business Director Compiles Data for Budget.

At that time, working plans for the new 2,500-capacity Shortridge High School, to be erected at Thirty-Fourth and Meridian Sts., are to be submitted for the board's approval by J. Edward Kopf, architect. Excavation of the tract is to begin Oct. 1.
