

CANTON'S WRATH NOT SO FIERCE, PRIMARY SHOWS

Few Voters Go to Polls—
Same Old 'Crowd' Wins
Control Again.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 12.—The righteous wrath against vice that swept Canton, Ohio, a few weeks ago as the result of the assassination of Don R. Mellett was neither as righteous nor as wrathful as it seemed to be at first, according to returns from Tuesday's primary election.

Of approximately 68,000 voters in Stark County, of which Canton is the county seat, only 22,000 went to the polls.

C. B. McClintock, county prosecutor, had failed to break up the rule of the "jungle," the underworld of Canton against which Mellett was battling at the time of his murder. The result was that McClintock was severely criticised, not only because of moral conditions in Canton, but also because he failed to bring about an effective investigation of the murder.

"Let George Do It"

Yet 47,000 of Stark County's citizenship which a few weeks before talked of demanding an accounting from responsible officials, remained away from the polls on election day and "let George do it." And George, with the help of the politicians, nominated Prosecutor McClintock for Congress on the Republican ticket.

A storm of indignation swept Cleveland a few weeks ago against Sheriff Fred Kohler, when the charge was made that Kohler was denying prisoners enough to eat, pocketing the difference between the amount allowed him to supply food and the amount he spent for it. Prisoners staged an all-night riot in the county jail, crying out that they were hungry.

Sheriff Wins Again

The county grand jury investigated and reported that there was just ground for the complaint. Yet, of 500,000 qualified voters in the county, only about 60,000 went to the polls and Fred Kohler was re-nominated for sheriff by a close margin.

The Anti-Saloon League may try to take credit to the cause of prohibition for the victory of Myers Y. Cooper, nominated as the Republican choice for the governorship. But Judge Florence E. Allen, every bit as dry as Cooper, was badly beaten by Albee Pomerene, classified as wet, in her race for the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate.

Pomerene's opponent in November will be Senator Frank E. Willis. If Pomerene wins in the election, he is bound to be a serious contender for the next Democratic presidential nomination.

In every important race in Ohio, "home of Presidents," this fact is made clear: Government in Ohio is by minority rule. The majority, in Tuesday's primary, did not vote at all.

NEW CRAB APPLES MAKE APPEARANCE

Winter Spinach Sells at City Market.

New crab apples, today at 10 cents a pound, appeared on the city mar-

ket stands today for the first time this summer. New winter spinach, at 20 cents an opund, replaced the summer variety. Tomatoes were higher at 10 cents a pound. Cantaloupes were up to 15 to 25 cents each and home grown long red icicle and button radishes, priced at 5 cents a bunch, reappeared. Shellout-beans were lower in price at two pounds for 25 cents and 35 cents a pound. Fresh lima beans were off sharply at 35 to 60 cents a pound. Green beans were down to 10 to 15 cents a pound. Other prices included: Malaga grapes, 15 cents a pound; seedless grapes, 10 cents a pound; blue damson plums, three pounds for 25 cents; Bartlett and sugar pears, 10 cents a pound; lemons, 20 to 40 cents a pound; oranges, 40 to 60 cents a pound; peaches, 15 cents a pound, and sweet potatoes, 10 cents a pound.

Silver corn was unchanged at three ears for 10 cents and golden bantam corn was the same price. Hale peaches were three pounds for 25 cents; red raspberries, 25 cents a pint; currants 25 cents a quart; alligator pears 50 to 60 cents each; and pickles, 50 cents to \$1 a hundred.
