

LABOR OFFICIAL DISCUSSES IDEAS ON IMMIGRATION

Expert Airing of Subject in
Next Session of
Congress.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—J. W. Brown, secretary of the International Federation of Trades Unions and one of the most influential and best informed labor philosophers in the world has ideas for America on the subject of immigration.

The last congress saw such an onslaught against the restricted immigration policy as few sessions have witnessed. When congress resumes after vacation, the attacks are expected to start again. During the

summer the country may be making up its mind.

"International labor should approve of any legislation which tends to keep up the standards of living of the working class," says Brown. This does not seem to commit him far as to America's own policy. But Brown goes on and explains:

Migration and Labor

The bearing of migration on trades unionism arises out of the danger that the influx of a large number of immigrants will lower the standards of life of the workers of the country into which they move. Migration gives employers a large supply of cheap and docile labor. It tends to break down what unions fought for. Also it is impossible to bring about united action among men of different races speaking different tongues. And it increases unemployment among native citizens."

Brown was secretary of the recent world emigration congress in London and is the author of a new and monumental book on "World Migration and Labor." For years he was active in the British engineering union. He studied at Oxford and Vienna.


