

WEEK-END ARREST TOTAL IS NORMAL

New Rules Governing Bondsmen Posted.

The past week-end was much like those of the last month in regard to the number of arrests, police records today showed. Saturday evening and Sunday, 192 persons were arrested. Of these, 177 were men and fifteen women.

New rules governing activities of bondsmen at city prison were posted in the turnkey's office today, having been drawn up by Chief Claude F. Johnson, Inspector Lewis Johnson and Judge Pro Tem Henry Winkler, serving during the vacation of Municipal Judge Paul Wetter.

Bondsmen are not to loaf in the corridors and must leave promptly after transacting business. One bondsmen at a time is to enter the turnkey's office. Any policeman telling the bondsmen the location of any raid or the name of any prisoner is to be suspended immediately.

Wins Election by Buying Land



By NEA Service. KANSAS CITY, Aug. 16.—Simon Fishman, 35 years ago a Russian immigrant, has been nominated by Greeley County (Kan.) Republicans for a seat in the State Legislature. If he wins election in the fall—as seems assured—he will be the first Jewish member of the Kansas Legislature.

There is an interesting story back of his victory. Greeley County was a Klan stronghold. But, a year or so ago, Fishman, who is wealthy, bought 35,000 acres and divided it into 160-acre wheat farms, which he sold or rented to Jewish settlers from New York. This changed the political complexion of the county, and this summer the Klan was hopelessly snowed under.

His chance for life isn't what anyone would call much.

For every 1,000 Negro babies born in Leavenworth, Kan., 871 die before reaching one year of age, according to figures made public today by the Federal census bureau.

For every 1,000 born in Jeffersonville, Ind., 409 die. For every 1,000 born in Cairo, Ill., 328 die.

On the other hand deaths of white babies under one year per 1,000 births in these three northern cities are respectively 77.4, 74.1 and 76.9.

'MILLIONS SAVED,' LORD

Budget Director Reports Accomplishments to Coolidge.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—Despite a \$55,000,000 increase in government expenditures in the last fiscal year, the budget bureau saved millions of dollars and prevented a still larger increase, Budget Director Herbert M. Lord advised President Coolidge in his annual report today. Lord's report gave the budget system credit for the treasury surplus which has been an annual affair since the budget law was passed in 1921. The report listed means utilized in saving money in all departments of the government and announced the public debt principal had been reduced \$572,974,572.
