

HISTORICAL BODY PLANS BUS TRIP TO STATE CONFAB

Programs for Session at
Terre Haute Sent to
Members.

Program for the summer meeting of the Indiana Historical Society at Terre Haute, Aug. 26 and 27, and details of the itinerary, were sent out today by Dr. Christopher B. Coleman, State Historical bureau director.

Members will assemble in Indianapolis Aug. 26. Chartered busses will leave the Traction Terminal station at 8:30, going by way of Danville to Rockville, where the caravan will be met by the Parke County Historical Society. They will be guests of the latter body at a luncheon at Turkey Run State Park.

From Turkey Run the group will proceed to Terre Haute, passing a station of the old underground railroad, where a tablet is to be dedicated, the Harrison Trail, the Ten O'Clock Line and Markle's Mill, built in 1816 and still in operation. Supper will be served at the Ft. Harrison Country Club, near Terre Haute. Meeting will be in the auditorium of the State Normal School.

Temporary chairman of the meeting will be Judge D. W. Henry, president of the Vigo County Historical Society. Dr. James A. Woodburn, president of the Indiana His-

torical Society, will be permanent chairman. J. A. Engleman, superintendent of the Terre Haute public schools, will give the address of welcome. Congressman Noble J. Johnson will speak. Interesting details of the excavation of the William Albion mound will be revealed by J. Arthur MacLean, director of the John Herron Art Institute. William Fortune, chairman of the George Rogers Clark sesquicentennial, is to speak on the exposition in Vincennes in 1929.

Busses will leave the Deming Hotel Friday morning at 8:30. For those who desire, a side trip will be made to the Albion mound in Sullivan County. Remainder of the party will be taken to points of historical interest in Terre Haute. Meeting in Brazil at noon, the party will be entertained at a luncheon at the Presbyterian Church by the Clay County Historical Society. The return to Indianapolis will be by way of Greencastle, seat of De Pauw University. The party is scheduled to arrive in Indianapolis at 6:30 Friday evening.

Bus fare for the round trip will be \$7, which will cover the Friday luncheon. Reservations should be made at once through E. A. Hendrickson, 237 S. Meridian St., Indianapolis.

City Official's Home Dynamited

PLAN NEW PARLEY ON LICENSE WAR

Kentucky-Indiana Officials
to Confer Here.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Aug. 18.—An attempt to reach a truce in the Indiana-Kentucky license war will be made Sept. 2 at a conference of Indiana and Kentucky officials in Indianapolis, it was learned today following a conference between Secretary of State Frederick E. Schortemeier and local business men.

Three plans of effecting the truce were outlined by the conferees here. The first will be to reach an agreement in the Sept. 2 meeting at which both sides of the license tag dispute will be aired.

Falling in this, Schortemeier plans to seek a Federal injunction restraining enforcement of the Kentucky law.

If this effort proves futile, a concerted reciprocal action against Kentucky by neighboring states will be negotiated.

Schortemeier pointed out that the Indiana statute requires the Secretary of State to accord automobiles from other States such privileges as are accorded Indiana automobiles operating in those States.

GAIN REPORTED IN DRUNKENNESS

Liquor Arrest Increase Despite General Drop.

While arrests in general decreased, more persons were arrested for drunkenness in July, 1926, than during the same month of last year.

Police arrested 217 less offenders but the total number of drunkards rounded up last month was 211 as opposed to 201 in July, 1925.

Convictions for drunkenness mounted in accord with a general increase in convictions this year.

Arrests for speeding also mounted. Johnson reported a saving of \$2,359 in gasoline bills during the first seven months of 1926 over the same period last year.

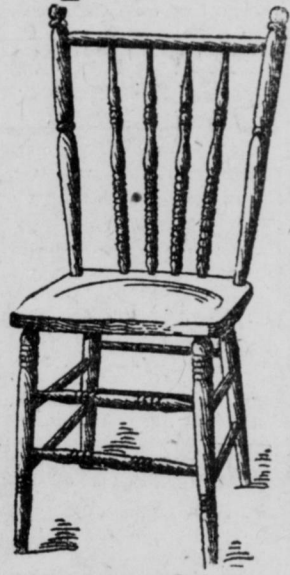

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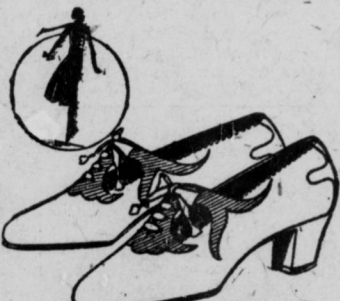
