

# CONTINUOUS RAIN IN INDIANA HELP TO GRAVEL ROADS

But Paving Is Slowed, Highway Commission Bulletin Points Out.

Continuous rains have proven advantageous to the maintenance of gravel and stone-surfaced highways, but have slowed paving in some localities. It was pointed out today in the State highway commission's traffic bulletin, issued by Director John D. Williams.

Williams said that paving has started on Rd. 8 and that this highway is closed from Hebron to De Motte. A detour is marked over the old road a portion of the way.

Attention was called to Rd. 39, now closed between Morristown and Rushville for paving, and it was pointed out that in a short time there will be twelve bridges under construction on this highway between Indianapolis and Rushville.

Detours will be established for local traffic, but through traffic between Indianapolis and Rushville should use Rds. 3 and 36. The bulletin shows detours eliminated on Rd. 4 at Busserton Creek east of Sullivan, and the same stream south of Sullivan on Rd. 10, and the opening to traffic of new pavement on Rd. 17 from the Ohio line to Butler.

Surface conditions on roads centering in Indianapolis:

Rd. 1 (New Albany, Indianapolis, South Bend, Michigan line)—Paving between marked for north and south traffic between Rushville and Plymouth. Bridge at Columbus, with separate detours marked for north and south traffic. These detours are rough and narrow in places.

Rd. 3 (Richmond, Indianapolis, Terre Haute)—Due to bridge construction, traffic is using traction bridge at Hise's Station, ten miles west of Richmond. Watchman handles traffic by stop-and-go signals. Drive slowly over one-way run-

Detour around paving at bridge at six miles north of Shelbyville. Closed for culvert construction at nine miles north of Shelbyville. Rd. 12 (Vincennes, Spencer, Indianapolis)—Short detour in Hickell, due to city construction work. Drive carefully at approaches to temporary bridge at two miles north of Gosport.

Rd. 15 (Indianapolis, Logansport, Winamac, Knox, Plymouth)—Under construction from La Porte to Kingsbury; detour marked. Account of construction, short detour at four miles south of Kirklin until Aug. 26. Detour from near Deer Creek to end of pavement south of Logansport account of paving.

Rd. 33 (Luganah, Paul, Bedford, Bloomington, Martinsville, Indianapolis)—Using new pavement between Martinsville and Bloomington, except for three-mile detour at two miles north of Bloomington. This pavement is not officially open. Some shoulder work remains to be done. Public travel road at its own risk. Between Paul and Bedford, (Both detours are poor.) Avoid south of Grantsburg, as there are no surface detour roads.

Rd. 39 (Indianapolis, Rushville, Brookville, Ohio line)—Three-mile detour around

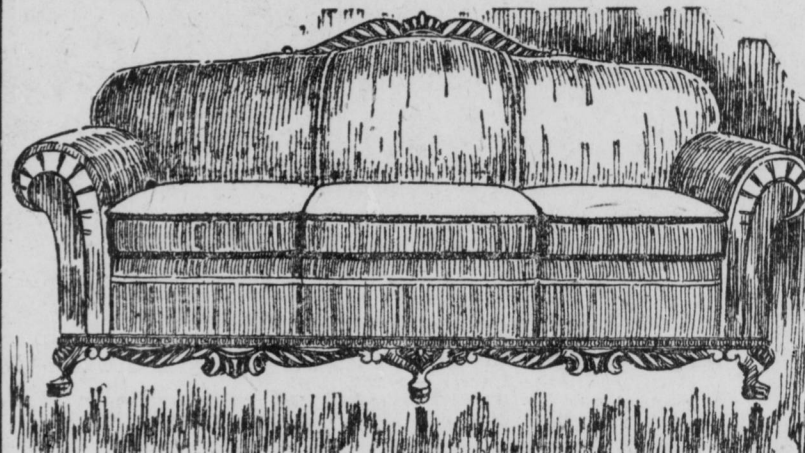
