

FORD EXTENDS RUSSIA CREDIT; WHY NOT U. S.?

Writer Says Soviet Nation
Is Communist Now in
Name Only.

This is the second of a series of six articles on Russia, by William Philip Simms, staff correspondent of the Indianapolis Times, and other Scripps-Howard newspapers. Simms has just completed a tour of the Soviet state.

MOSCOW (By Mail)—Henry Ford has just sold 10,000 tractors to the Russians. Also a lot of spare parts. This single deal represents \$5,000,000. That's a lot of money. Yet Ford extended the Communists ten months' credit, the first credit, it was told, he ever extended to anybody.

Not only that, but he is preparing to establish service stations all over the country, which will mean more sales and more long-term credit.

If this does not mean the tide has turned for Russia, nothing does. Henry Ford has the reputation of being as hard-boiled a business man as there is in hard-boiled United States. Nobody has ever accused him of being in business for his health.

Other Business
The American Tool Works, of Cincinnati, also does a big business with Russia, some of their more important orders being on a part credit basis. Their representatives say the business has been at all time satisfactory.

The same story is told by other American concerns, cotton merchants, makers of machinery, bankers and so on. Reeve Schley, vice-president of the Chase National Bank of New York, said they had been doing business with Russian organizations, both in America and in Russia, for the past two years and their experience throughout had been satisfactory.

Over 700 American firms are now doing business with Russia on an admittedly satisfactory basis. And the number is constantly growing. The story is also true of Germany, Britain, France, Holland, Sweden and other countries.

Wild Days Passing
Which means that the era of a wild and woolly Russia, where irresponsible and rampant communism was rushing blindly into mistake after mistake, is over. Instead there is a Russia, still communist if you will, but becoming practical as the result of hard knocks.

I have talked this over with several Soviet officials. They every one admit Russia must meet her obligations religiously if she is to survive.

The Russia of today is as different from the Russia of three or four years ago as day is from night. The Russia of tomorrow will be different still.

Communist in Name Only
It looks very much as though Communist Russia is here to stay. At least for some time to come. But Russia is already becoming Communist in name only.

The United States is a Christian country. But when the President and his Cabinet or the Congress sit down to work out American policy and American laws they do not first say: "Now what would Christ do were He doing this thing?" They do what they consider the practical thing.

Similarly Russia is a Communist country. Today, however, her rulers are consulting less and less what the pure Communist would do in the circumstances and instead are striving to find practical solutions of their difficulties.

This is something that Americans do not know. They are still being told raw-head-and-bloody-bones stories about the bolsheviks and how Russia is spending her time devising ways and means to plant the red flag on the White House. Which is sheer nonsense.

Theoretically Russia still would like to see a "dictatorship of the proletariat" established all over the world. But today she is waking from any such dream and is beginning to realize she has her hands very full indeed running her own affairs.

Tomorrow she will be fully awake.

Phillip, formerly head of the Phillip Lithographing Company, Milwaukee, died Sunday in Mexico, just as she was about to be summoned before the American consul at Mexico City for further questioning in the damage action started April 28 in Milwaukee Circuit Court by Mrs. Margaret Howard, alleged divorced wife of the Haverhill manufacturer.
