

WOOLLEN URGES EQUAL CHANCE

Says Good Government Excludes Privileges.

LINTON, Ind., Aug. 25.—That government is best which most fully assures equality of opportunity and excludes privilege, declared Evans Woolen, Democratic candidate for United States Senator, here Tuesday night.

Criticising legislation generally he continued:

"The best illustration of departure from that principle is the Fordney-McCumber act. That act was the expression of the spirit of sordid selfishness. The average of tariff duties was raised 59 per cent. The purpose of so raising duties was to raise prices. That is always the purpose of a protective tariff act—to raise prices."
