

BANDITS GET CAR FROM VICTIMS; HAVE BUSY NIGHT

Leave Couple Stranded—
Auto, Cartridge and Coat
Found Later.

A .38-calibre revolver cartridge and a woman's jacket were the only clues police had today to three bandits, who in the past week have staged a dozen hold-ups on country roads near the city. Three of the up-sets were staged Wednesday night.

In the first hold-up of the evening the bandits robbed Herbert Main, 212 E. Minnesota St., of \$9 and took his Chrysler roadster. The car was found by Sergeant Hanley and Patrolman Swope at 4:30 a. m. today at 430 W. Maryland St. The cartridge and jacket were in the car. License plates had been changed by turning one figure under.

Took His Car

Main and Miss Virginia Roberts, 2644 N. Capitol Ave., were driving near Sixty-Sixth St. and the Nickel Plate Railroad, when three young men in a Ford coupe drove up and ordered them to come out of the car. They took the money and auto keys from Main, drove the Chrysler away, followed by the Ford, and left the couple stranded.

Miss Roberts avoided being robbed by tossing her purse into the weeds as she left the car. It was later found by Sergt. John Richter. All three of the men were armed, but accurate descriptions were impossible because of darkness, Main said.

BUSINESS MEN AGAINST RESORT

Fourteen Testify to Convict Women.

Fourteen N. Capitol Ave. business men testified in municipal court before Judge Pro Tem. William H. Faust, this morning against the alleged keeper and inmates of a resort at 427 N. Capitol Ave.

As a result of their testimony Ruth Hills, of that address, was sentenced to serve thirty days in the Indiana Woman's Prison and fined \$100.

Two women in the house when it was raided by police, Alice William and Lela Bolen, were fined \$10 and sentenced to ten days in jail.

Two of three soldiers in the place received like sentences and the third was fined \$10 and given a suspended thirty-day term. All the cases are to be appealed.
