

MAYOR MOVES TO END SQUABBLE OF SANITARY BOARD

Drafts Letter Concerning
Disposal Plant Fight—
No Hearing on Ross.

Mayor Duvall intends to take a vigorous part in pacifying the warring members of the board of sanitary commissioners, it was indicated today.

Duvall is drafting a letter concerning the recent squabble over city sewage disposal plant management, which has split the board in two factions.

Expected Stand

ALLISONVILLE ROAD OPEN

Heavy Traveled Highway Improvement Completed.

County Engineer W. W. Southard today announced the opening Thursday of the Allisonville Rd. from the fairground bridge to Keystone Ave. This road was known as the most traveled unimproved road entering Indianapolis. The highway has been resurfaced with bituminous macadam, twenty feet wide. The newly improved stretch is three-fourths of a mile long.

Completion of this project probably will result in the paving of E. Forty-Second St. past the Indiana School for the Deaf. The Legislature last year appropriated \$50,000 to be used by the State highway department in paving Forty-Second St. when Marion County paved Fall Creek Blvd. The portion of the Allisonville Rd. just finished is part of the boulevard.

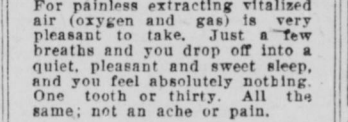
