

## RIFFIAN PROBLEM IS STILL PRESENT IN SPAIN, FRANCE

Military Forces Will Not Be Reduced for Year or More.

PARIS, Sept. 3.—Now that Abd-el-Krim has been definitely eliminated, the people of France and Spain are asking themselves when, if ever, the rebel Rifflans of Morocco will be definitely conquered. In France, at least, it is believed almost certain that there can be no reduction of the military forces in Morocco for a year or more. The problem confronting the government is the extent of military cooperation necessary between France and Spain to keep off the menace of another Riffian uprising. French Are Peaceful

The political and economic interests of the two countries in Morocco are divergent. The methods pursued in the two zones into which the Sherifian empire is divided are radically different. In the French zone peaceful penetration and friendliness toward the tribes have been the watchword. On the contrary, in the Spanish zone the rule has been to consider the tribesmen as enemies who must be reduced by war. French public opinion is opposed to sending any French troops into the Spanish zone even if Spain should declare it necessary.

Although many thousand of hitherto unfriendly tribesmen have laid down their arms and made formal submission to the French in their zone the Rifflans look upon the Spaniards as invaders who must be fought until they are driven into the sea. Spain will be forced to carry on the warfare she commenced five centuries ago, whereas

France has only to organize the northern boundary of her zone to prevent further incursions from the Riff.

The question is asked whether the overthrow of Abd-el-Krim will not have a disastrous influence on the economic situation of the French zone. The Rifflans need cereals, sugar and tea and they must send out thousands of farm workers for the harvest in the region of Fez, as well as in Algeria. There are reports that the Spaniards intend to construct a great port at Alhucemas so as to direct the export of Riff products toward Barcelona through Melilla. The French would of course prefer to see this flow of wealth coming through the French zone toward Oujda and Oran.
