

TWO KILLED IN GARY HOLD-UPS

Bandit Slain After Gun Duel
From Taxicab.

GARY, Ind., Sept. 3.—Two men were dead, and a third was badly wounded as a result of shooting during a lone bandit's raid on Gary business houses in the center of the city at midnight last night.

Harry Bolds, the bandit who attempted to hold up business houses single-handed, was killed, after a pistol duel from taxicab windows with Policeman Michael Flynn. Bolds had just killed Chester Costenbarger, a poolroom clerk, who had refused to open the safe in his office. Flynn was shot through the body. Physicians say he has a chance for recovery.

Bolds, a lake seaman, held up the Broadway Hotel shortly before midnight, then attempted his raid on the club pool and billiard rooms, where Costenbarger refused to open the safe. Flynn, seeing Bolds leaving the scene of the shooting in a taxicab, gave chase through the streets of Gary in a cab he had commandeered. The chase lasted for nine blocks, with both firing from the windows. Then the cabs stopped and the fire continued as both dodged behind the cars' tonneaus. Flynn fell with a bullet in his side, but fired from the ground, and his bullet passed through the robber's body, killing him instantly.

the most gigantic farce ever perpetrated on free American women inasmuch as all women workers are selected and appointed by men.

"The title of vice chairman is but an empty honor, since the women holding it have no vote in party convention, save in the absence of the man chairman.

"This is in absolute contradiction of the spirit of the Nineteenth Amendment. Women eligible to vote constitute better than 51 per cent of the entire vote in Indiana. They are in politics to stay and when the men realize that women will not follow a woman leader not of their own choosing there will be a new day in Republican politics in Indiana."

For Equal Power

A similar view was held by Mrs. M. B. Spellman, the first Republican woman city chairman, Marion County woman manager for Governor Ed Jackson two years ago and formerly in charge of organizing women in industry for the Republican State committee.

Mrs. Spellman said: "The thousands of splendid women of Indiana, whether Republicans or Democrats, must certainly resent any statement or insinuation that their vote, secured for them by the untiring work and sacrifices of such noble women as Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Alice Paul, Carrie Chapman Catt and their loyal followers, is held so lightly that it may be influenced by any such unworthy method as has been insinuated. The women of Indiana will never be satisfied until they

have an opportunity to choose for themselves the women who are to represent them in political parties in this State or elsewhere.

"Remove from them the handicap of men appointed women and Republican women will come into their own and will be able to give the party the constructive work for which they are peculiarly fitted."

is given a warning. On the second offense, his license automatically is revoked.

"Naturally, he is not going to take a chance on losing a valuable license, and so he dispenses his wares with care," Dr. Wicks explained.

An effort has been made to arouse animosity to the United States through articles in the London Daily Mail, the Northcliffe paper, Dr. Wicks said.

These articles point out that while the British war debt to the United States is roughly \$4,678,765,000, the Allies' war debt to Britain is about \$10,312,250,000. They further state that all the money which Britain is repaying the United States was spent in buying American goods. The much greater losses in man power suffered by the British is referred to.

But, combating the stand of the Daily Mail is the more influential London Times, which advocates payment and a cessation of bickering.

Dr. Wicks related an interesting talk which he had with former Premier Asquith, now the Earl of Oxford, on the subject of war debt cancellation.

Asquith had asserted that "England will pay every cent of its indebtedness to the United States."

He was questioned if it would not be the gracious thing for the United States to cancel the debt, and his reply, a diplomatic gem, was, "That is not for an Englishman to say."

Though there are great numbers of persons out of work, a great percentage of them as a result of the

coal strike, England looks as prosperous as she did in 1922, the time of his last visit there, Dr. Wicks stated.

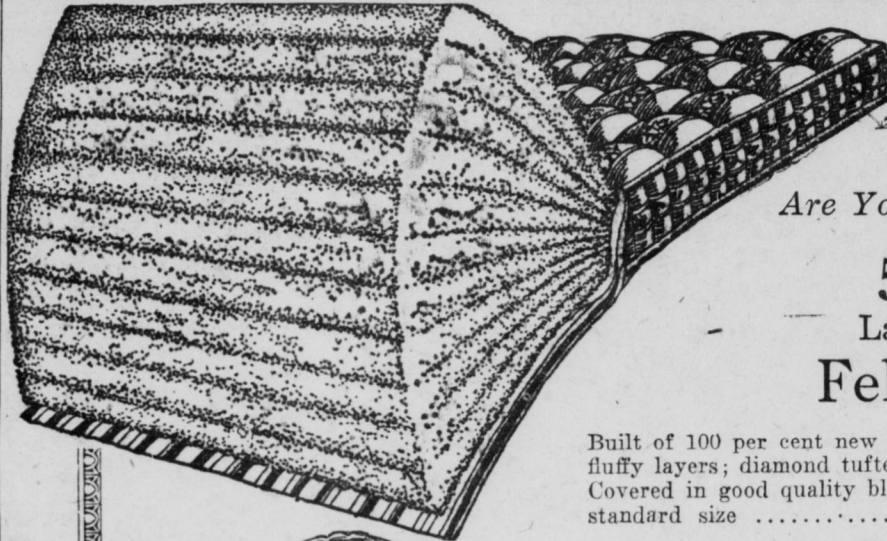
"Things change slowly in England and the people do not reveal their sufferings or misfortunes. They do not complain," he said.

Illustrative of the stability of the English, he told of a conversation with Ralph Mottram, author of one of the outstanding books dealing with the World War, "The Spanish Farm." Mottram, a bank employee, said that his father, his grandfather and his great-grandfather had

worked at the desk at which he now works in the bank.

Mottram, it was, who made the interesting statement to Dr. Wicks that King George V, the present monarch, is the first king of the Hanoverian line to speak pure English.

Dr. Wicks is from an English family and has traced his ancestors in the town of Trowbridge, in Wiltshire, back to the time of Henry VIII, who ruled in the sixteenth century. The last of the family living there died this summer.

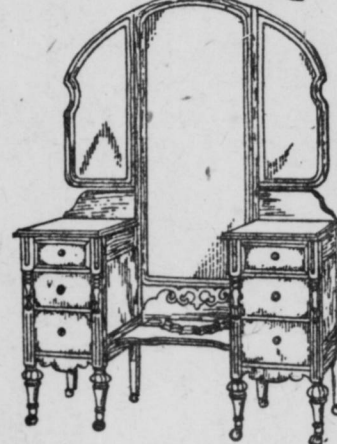

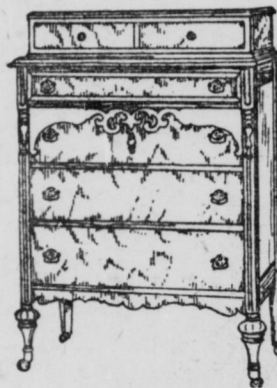

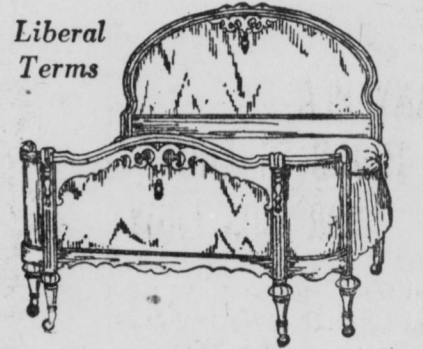
