In the gubernatorial race Fred R. Zimmerman, secretary of State, continued to gain over Herman L. Ekern, attorney-general. Zimmerman is a progressive but challenges the right of Governor Blaine to lead the State's progressives. Blaine sponsored Ekern's candidacy.

Results from 1,768 precincts in the Republican gubernatorial primaries gave:

Zimmerman, 139,171.

Ekern, 111,133.

The Republican nomination in Wisconsin is tantamount to election and there were no Democratic contests for Senate or Governor.

MOSES RENOMINATED

Class Concedes Victory to New Hampshire Senator.

CONCORD, N. H., Sept. 8.—Senator George H. Moses was renominated in Tuesday's Republican senatorial primary by a plurality of about 17,000, returns from 261 towns and wards out of a total of 394 indicated today. Former Governor Robert P. Bass early today conceded the nomination of Senator Moses, whom he had opposed in the primary.

Governor John G. Winant appeared to have lost his primary fight for renomination to Huntley N. Spaulding, chairman of the State board of education. The Republican gubernatorial vote stood: Spaulding, 17,055; Winant, 23,632.

Eaton D. Sargent of Nashua was given the Democratic gubernatorial nomination without a contest.

Robert C. Murchie of Concord appeared to have been renominated for United States Senator by the Democrats over Albert W. Noone of Peterboro. Only a few hundred votes were cast in the contest.


GEORGIA VOTES TODAY

Four-Cornered Race for Democratic Gubernatorial Nomination.

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 8.—Clear weather and a vigorous campaign, especially in the four-cornered gubernatorial nomination race, was expected to bring out a large vote in the State Democratic primary today. The World Court issue between the senatorial aspirants was overshadowed by the contest among John Hoder of Jefferson, chairman of the State highway commission; George Carswell of Irwinton, J. O. Wood of Atlanta and Dr. L. G. Hardman of Commerce for the governorship nomination.

Senator Walter F. George, World Court adherent, was favored to defeat Justice Richard Russell of the State Supreme Court for the senatorial nomination. Russell declares the court is "an iniquitous institution."

Harmsworth Speedboat Trophy Stays With Gar Wood, Detroit.


