

STATE MEDICAL BODY CONVENES

More Than 1,000 Doctors
Expected to Attend.

WEST BADEN, Ind., Sept. 22.—Members of the Indiana State Medical Association are here today for the opening sessions of the seventy-seventh annual convention of the organization.

More than a thousand doctors are expected to attend the three-day meeting. Business meetings of the State council and the house of delegates at noon today were to officially open the convention and the annual golf tournament this afternoon was to inaugurate the entertainment program.

Scientific sessions will open Wednesday morning with a general meeting of all delegates. Charles N. Coombs of Terre Haute, associate president, will speak.

The principal speaker at the general scientific session will be Dr. Ernst Loewenstein of Vienna, Austria, one of the foreign delegates to the meeting of the International Union Against Tuberculosis. He will speak on "Some Phases of Tuberculosis."

Many of Indiana's leading specialists will address the body during the course of the convention.

The annual banquet will be held Thursday evening at the West Baden Springs Hotel.



FIRE DESTROYS PALATIAL YACHT

Loss of Former Mrs. Dodge
Is \$1,000,000.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—A mysterious fire destroyed the palatial yacht Delphine, owned by Mrs. Hugh Dilman, the former Mrs. Anna T. Dodge of Detroit, in the Hudson River early today. The loss was placed by Dilman at \$1,000,000.

The crew of fifty men fought a dogged three-hour battle with the flames. Fire boats played water on the blazing craft. Belle Weaver, a maid, gathered up jewels valued at \$250,000 in Mrs. Dilman's stateroom and made shore in a lifeboat.

The ship had been anchored for several days in North River. The Dilmans had gone to a theater when the fire broke out around midnight. The ship's wireless summoned fire boats and headed for the Ninety-Sixth St. docks in the Hudson. Members of the crew said they believed defective wiring on a smoldering cigarette was responsible.
