

SELECTION OF CANDIDATES TO END ON MONDAY

Parties in New York to Name Their Aspirants for Senate.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Final formalities in the selection of sixty-six Republican and Democratic senatorial candidates will be completed with the New York choice of a Democratic senatorial candidate Monday. Campaign managers of both parties set their gears in motion here today for opening of the fall campaign.

Senator McNary, Republican, Oregon, returned from a Republican managerial pow-wow in Chicago to rally speakers to the standard, including many cabinet officers. Senator Gerry, Rhode Island, chairman of the Democratic senatorial campaign committee held a conference with Senator Bayard, Democrat, Delaware, to arrange opening of the Democratic speakers' bureau here.

This activity is the direct result of the promised closing of the primary campaigns Monday. At that time New York Democrats will designate Charles F. Wagner as their senatorial candidate to oppose Senator Wadsworth, Republican incumbent and then fight officially will be on.


Since early spring thirty-three State primary elections have been held in which senatorial candidates were chosen of the twenty-five Republican Senators up for re-election, six had their political heads lopped off in the primaries. Nineteen won the primaries.

On the other hand, out of five Democrats up for re-election, five were nominated. Only in Alabama was a change made in the Democratic phalanx. There Senator Oscar Underwood declined to run again and Hugo L. Black received the Democratic nomination.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Consolidation of Southern Pacific subsidiaries in the Texas and Louisiana area, now operated as separate lines, was proposed today by the Texas and New Orleans Railroad in an application filed with the interstate commerce commission.

The roads involved cover a mileage of approximately 4,000 miles and the stock is owned by the Southern Pacific.

Put in Jail

Disturbed Looking

Dr. Wagner said the man makes a good impression upon people, but a half hour's conversation with him would disclose his irrational streak. Lewis is a distinguished looking man, with a white goatee and moustache.

Dr. Bahr declared that Lewis' application for admittance is probably with the thirty-two others. There are also nineteen persons from outside counties waiting admittance, he said.

Last July there were fifty-two persons accepted, Dr. Bahr declared. There are now 778 patients from Marion County in the hospital, the superintendent pointed out. The county is allotted 695 beds, he said.

MARION COUNTY INSANE LACKING HOSPITALIZATION

There are thirty-two insane persons in Marion County awaiting admittance to Central Hospital for the Insane, Dr. Max A. Bahr, superintendent, reported today. The institution now has 1,760 patients, 300 more than it can normally accommodate, Dr. Bahr declared.

Never Promenaded
