

## POLICEMEN WON CLUB ELECTION, LOSERS DECLARE

Regular Ticket, Headed by Haskett, Elected by Hoosier Motor Body.

Policemen won the election for the "regular ticket" of the Hoosier Motor Club, supporters of the "independent ticket" charged today.

President Robert B. Rhoads denied the charges and said that no police men voted.

The election was held from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday at club headquarters, 22 W. Vermont St. The "regular ticket" candidates were O. D. Haskett, president of the Haskett

Lumber Company; Roy E. Adams, general manager of J. L. Adams & Co., and E. W. Harris, vice president and treasurer Hamilton-Harris & Co.

### Mailed Letters

Haskett is president of the board of safety and the opposition attributed unusual interest by Police Chief Claude F. Johnson and his men to that fact. Johnson sent personal letters to all of his friends asking them to support the "regular ticket."

The "regulars" secured 454 votes and the "independents" only 67, according to announcement made at headquarters.

"Independent" candidates were Seth Klein, president of the Gabriel Sales and Service Company; Felix M. McWhirter, president of Peoples State Bank and Harry Templeton, president of Harry Templeton Company, real estate.

### TUBERCULOSIS TOLL CUT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Deaths from tuberculosis are decreasing, the commerce department announced today. In 1924, the male death rate from the disease was 89.7 persons per 100,000, while the female rate was 77.2. The rate in 1920 was 11.5 males and 101.7 females.

"Such a law doesn't mean anything," Lucille McCormick, 15, of 223 W. Twenty-Eighth St., declared. "I sure won't go over very big. Just because we stay out until after 9 p.m. is no sign we are going to steal a machine and rob a filling station. That can be done in the daytime by those who make it their business."

Lillian O'Riley, 1935 N. Talbot St., said "goodby" when told about the law. Her seventeenth birthday was last month.

Virginia Cochrane, 16, of 4221 Broadway saw no reason to think it wrong to stay out after 9 "if your parents don't object."

Margaret Marshall, 16, of 2337 N. Talbot Ave., when told about the new law, inquired "What for?"

Walter Peek, 16, of 3334 N. New Jersey St., was one of the boy students who voted it "Applesauce." It was pointed out that the football players already are under rules that require them to be in early.

## CUT TAXES NOW, DEMOCRATS PLAN

### Party Unanimous Upon Issue

—Fight in Congress.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Democratic talk about a three hundred million-dollar tax cut this year over the heads of President Coolidge and Secretary Mellon is developing into a systematized drive of unexpected proportions.

Democrats are now unanimous upon an issue—namely, that the treasury surplus should be used immediately to lower all taxes instead of being permitted to accumulate until 1928, presidential year.

The United Press learned that Senator Simmoins, ranking Democratic member of the Senate Finance Committee, is now drawing a tax cut resolution to be introduced the day Congress reconvenes. Minority leaders have agreed to force the resolution to a vote, and it appears the big fight of the coming session will center around the proposal.

## OIL CASE WITH COURT

Arguments Completed in Doheny Lease Annulment Suit.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The United States Supreme Court today held under advisement the Doheny Elk Hills oil lease annulment suit, in which arguments had been completed by Atlee Pomerene and Owen J. Roberts for the Government, and by Frank J. Hogan and Frederic Kellogg, for Doheny's Pan-American petroleum companies.

A decision in the case may come within a few months.


