

CITES VALUE OF  
EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Stump Asserts It Is Well  
Both Sexes' Vote.

CONNERSVILLE, Ind., Oct. 22.—  
"It is fortunate, indeed, that at this  
time in the development of the po-  
litical events of the nation the prob-  
lems of human cooperation and or-  
ganization, the problems of govern-  
ment are faced by men and women  
together, both clothed with responsi-  
bility in assisting in their proper so-  
lution."

Albert Stump, Democratic nominee  
for the long term in the United  
States Senate, made that declaration  
here this afternoon in addressing a  
political rally.

"How fortunate it is that men and  
women, the husband and the wife,  
the father and the mother, together  
face the problems of politics, on the  
correct solution of which depends  
the well-being of that fundamental  
institution of society, the family,"  
the nominee declared.

FARM VALUES LESS

Democratic Nominee Links Decline  
With Government's Policies.

RICHMOND, Ind., Oct. 22.—  
Figures on the shrinkage of farm  
values in Indiana during the past  
five years were cited by Albert  
Stump, Democratic nominee for the  
long term in the United States Sen-  
ate, to show the wide difference in  
opportunity created by the policies  
of the Government operating upon  
conditions of the past few years.  
Stump spoke at a large political  
rally here Thursday night. He cited  
figures showing that farm lands of  
the United States were valued at  
\$75,000,000,000 in 1920 and at only  
\$55,000,000,000 in 1925.

"In the difference of opportunity  
which has arisen through the policies  
of the Government is found a danger  
to the very perpetuity of free gov-  
ernment," Stump asserted.

STEEL PACT PROPOSED

Gary Suggests Concordat With  
European Manufacturers.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Possibility  
of a concordat between steel man-  
ufacturers of Europe and the United  
States was suggested by Judge E.  
H. Gary of the United States Steel  
Corporation in an address today be-  
fore the American Iron and Steel  
Institute.

"We have heard recently of con-  
siderable discussion relating to an-  
ticipated competition between the  
iron and steel manufacturers of the  
United States and foreign com-  
petitors," said Gary, "but it is be-  
lieved that should it become  
necessary an international con-  
ference will be held between all  
these interests and a full, open dis-  
cussion indulged in, after which a  
fair understanding could be reached."

"Of course no agreement between  
the different interests relating to  
prices could legally be entered into  
without sanction of our law adminis-  
trators. But if the necessity arose,  
it is thought that the approval of  
the public authority of the country,  
if they were fully informed and per-  
mitted to express opinions on the  
subject, might be obtained."

HAAG CASE, GEM  
THEFTS, PROBED

Murder Inquiry Here—Three  
Arrests in Chicago.

Solution of the Wilkinson Haag  
murder case and of recent huge dia-  
mond thefts in Chicago moved along  
today.

In Indianapolis, the Marion  
County grand jury heard evidence  
against Lawrence Chere, 26, and  
Carl J. Hanson, alias Ray Harrison,  
on charges of murdering Haag Drug  
Company official at the Green Mill  
barbecue May 17. The two are un-  
der arrest at Englewood, N. J.

And in Chicago three men were  
held in connection with the diamond  
thefts, in which Chere and Har-  
rison have been implicated. The  
three, taken late Thursday, are  
George Kannersley, Rupert McDon-  
ald and Henry Nemeroff, alias A.  
Gonsolos.

Kannersley is said to have been  
at the Kentucky Derby at Louisville  
with Chere and Hanson. Shortly  
after this Haag was shot. Because  
some of the men arrested admit pur-  
chasing here recently a large sedan  
similar to the one used in the Port-  
land, Ind., \$26,000 bank robbery, of-  
ficers say they probably staged that  
job.


