Around the four gray stone houses of this town, wheat fields grow out to the corporate limits and turkeys and ducks stroll nonchalantly down the main street of La Tartre-Gaudren. Once there was a church, but it fell in and is now surrounded by wheat. There is a mail box at the town hall, but it is often three weeks before a letter is pushed through its slot.

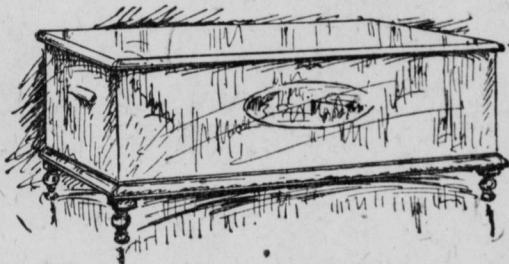
MEASURE WAVES

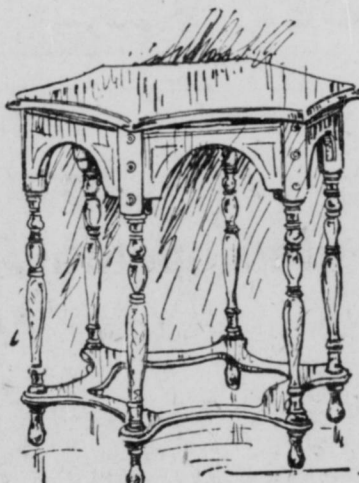

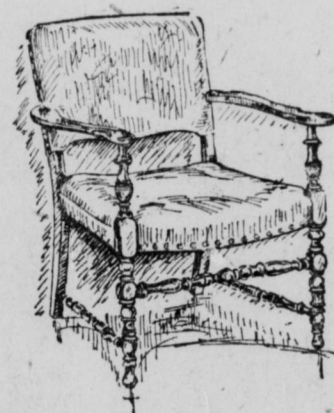
