

SECOND SUICIDE ATTEMPT FATAL

Insurance Collector Takes Life by Poison.

A second attempt by Carlton Hollowell, 39, of 612 Luett St., to take his life, proved effective. He did in city hospital admitting room from poison, self-administered.

Mrs. Hollowell called the police to her home when she found her husband lying on the porch with the smell of poison on his breath. He tried to kill himself about a year ago and recently, according to his widow, had been brooding over the fact that he had been held up and robbed of \$86, collections of the Public Savings Insurance Company.

Besides the widow, Hollowell is survived by three children, ranging in ages from 1 to 7 years; his mother, Mrs. Hannah Hollowell, and four brothers and two sisters, all of this city. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.
