NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Dec. 1.—A legal battle over where Guy Pritchard, soldier, was killed looms in the trial of David Orr and Jacob Ratcliffe, prominent Tipton County farmers, charged with the soldiers' murder.

Orr and Ratcliffe were indicted by the grand jury at Kokomo on grounds that the alleged murder was committed in Howard County and that the body was taken to Carmel in an auto and thrown out.

Defense attorneys say they have proof Pritchard met his death in Hamilton County.

If this is true, charges against the farmers at Kokomo may be quashed and the grand jury may be asked to investigate.
