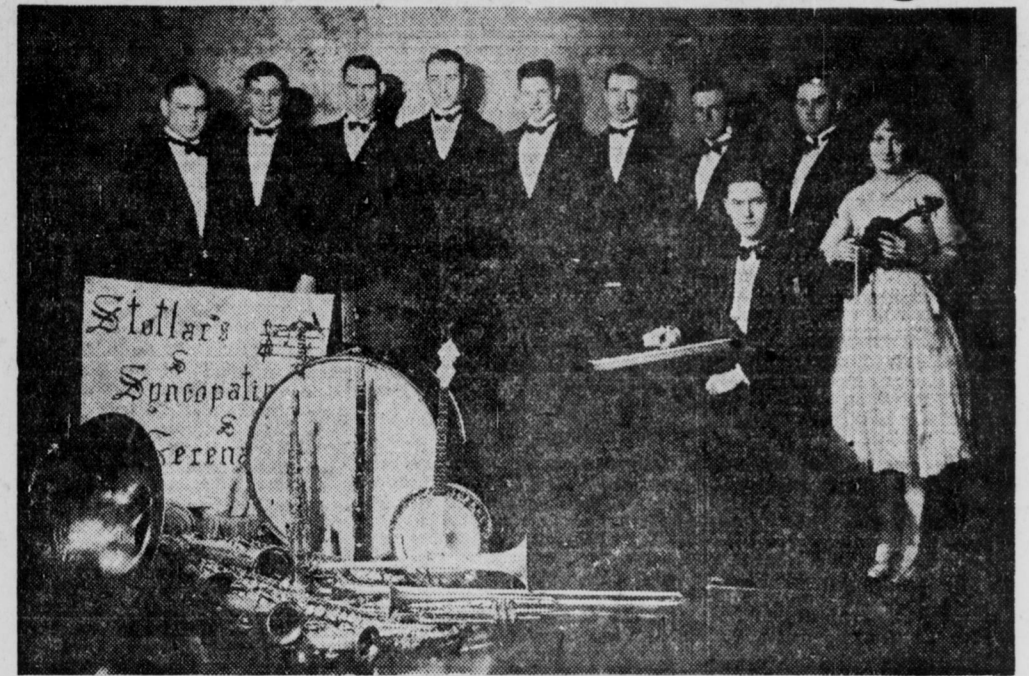

COMPANY PLANTS TREES

Reforestation of Abandoned Coal Lands Begins.

Reforestation of abandoned coal
and shale lands is to be undertaken
by the State conservation commis-
sion in cooperation with Superintend-
ent John Meighardt, Big Ben Coal
Company, Center Point, Ind. The
first experiment will be the plant-
ing of ten acres of the company's
abandoned land with native trees.

Menghardt has agreed to pur-
chase 12,000 trees from the conserva-

tion department, according to Direc- tor Richard Lieber. Planting will be done by employees of the mine opera- tor and under the supervision of the State foresters. Trees will come from the State nursery operated in connection with the Clarke County State Forest Reserve and Experi- ment Station.

Species selected include white pine,
American red pine, Australian pine,
yellow poplars and a number of na-
tive hardwoods that are rapid grow-
ers.
