

NEBRASKA BANK PATRONS NEVER LOSE IN FAILURES

State Guarantee Law Protects Depositors—Runs Unknown.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Runs on banks are unknown in Nebraska today.

Representative Schallenberger, of Nebraska, under whose administration as Governor of the State the Nebraska bank guarantee law was passed, explains how this peaceful State of confidence has been brought about among the people of his State.

Every State bank in Nebraska is assessed a certain amount per year for the guarantee fund. All State banks are thus held responsible for the obligations of each other, and

all chip in to meet these obligations in case of necessity.

If a bank is going under, the banking commission sends its own men to the bank and takes over the management.

In some cases the bank remains open and the commission loans money from the guarantee fund to put the bank on its feet.

In other cases, the bank is closed and within a day or two all deposits are returned to the people, intact and without discount.

Burden Not On Innocent

The losses, in case of a bank failure, are borne by the other bankers of the State and the stockholders. The burden of loss is not placed, as is ordinarily the case, on the innocent depositors.

It is absolutely necessary for the success of such a law, Schallenberger says, that the State bankers should have something to say about who shall be permitted to go into the banking business that there should be strict limitation and regulation.

Commission Controls

It is also necessary to have the control of a failing bank taken over by a banking commission, rather than to put it in the hands of a receiver appointed by the court.

Receivers, Schallenberger main-

tains, are usually appointed at fat salaries and have a way of eating up all the assets on hand so that there is nothing left for the depositors.

A bill introduced in the House by Representative Edgar Howard, also of Nebraska, would apply the Nebraska system to national banks.


