

PROHIBITION ATTORNEY DENIES CHARGES

Claims Contempt Count Is Mud-Slinging, Insinuating.

Emphatic denial that fraud was perpetrated in the Supreme Court was made Wednesday by Ethan A. Miles, who, with Jesse Martin, Indiana Anti-Saloon League attorneys, were charged with "misleading the court through false statements" by Jacob Morgan, local attorney. Morgan declared the Anti-Saloon League attorneys were guilty of "contemptible conduct" in a liquor appeal of Isaac Levy and Morris Assael.

Assael and Levy were found guilty of violating the liquor law in a county court, appealed to the Appellate Court, were defeated and were recently denied a transfer to the Supreme Court. Morgan made the charges in a brief asking the Supreme Court to reconsider a petition to transfer the case to the higher court from the Appellate Court.

Morgan declared he presented an assignment of errors in the case when he asked to have it transferred to the Supreme Court, and that the League's attorneys made misstatements.

VETS GET LOANS ON CERTIFICATES

Union Trust Co. Negotiates Paper on Small Margin.

Disregarding the precedent established by the majority of local banks and trust companies in extending loans to World War veterans on their adjusted compensation service certificates, the Union Trust Com-

pany, 114 E. Market St., announced today that since Jan. 1 they have made loans on 175 certificates.

John E. Reed, vice-president, explained that the law provides a loaning organization may charge 2 per cent more interest than the Federal discount rate which is now 4 per cent. This allows the company a rate of 6 per cent interest on the loans, which they make for six months.

"Interest of only \$3 on a loan of \$100 for six months does not pay for the volume of bookkeeping necessitated by the exacting requirements made by the Government in filling out the forms," Reed continued.

"Only four of our own customers are included in the list."
