

SEEK TO PREVENT DOUBLE TAXATION

Introduce Measure Which
Would List Shareholders.

A bill to amend the tax law so as to require every company incorporated under the laws of other States and doing business in Indiana to report names and addresses of their Indiana shareholders to the State tax board has been introduced in the House at the request of the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce.

The amendment is designed to prevent the taxation of the property and the shares of the corporation owned in Indiana at the same time, as well as to remove the incentive for the sequestering of such shares. It provides that the shares of such company's stock shall not be taxed when the amount held in the State does not exceed the value of the corporation's property which is taxed in Indiana, and that the shares shall only be taxed the percentage that they exceed the valuation on the corporation's Indiana property.

In offering the amendment, the legislative committee of the State chamber points out that under the present law both the property and the stock of corporations of other States are taxed in Indiana, thereby bringing about double taxation that tends to discourage corporations of stock to encourage corporations of other States from investing in property located in Indiana.
