

## REED STILL HITS AT WORLD COURT

Predicts Defeat of Hinted  
Plan for U. S. Entry.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Senate irreconcilables, who were singing a jubilant "Swan Song" today over the World Court, are expecting a movement seeking acceptance by the United States of changes asked by Great Britain in American reservations to entry.

Such a movement, it was made plain today, will not come from the Senate, since Administration leaders joined with irreconcilables in declaring that the request by Great Britain for revision ends the court as far as the United States is concerned.

Senator Reed (Dem., Missouri), who stood with Senator Borah (Rep., Idaho), in fighting the court, predicted any such movement would fail, "since the people are at last aroused."

"English statesmen," Reed declared, "recognized the foolishness of the reservations that put us halfway in and halfway out. It is very fortunate for us."

## Urges Owners to 'Know' Their Cars

Do you know all the numbers or marks on your car by which it might be most easily identified in case of theft?

The question is asked by Todd Stoops, secretary-manager of the Hoosier Motor Club, who suggests now is an ideal time for motorists to obtain information concerning their machines.

"There are any number of such numerical groups and in some respects knowing them is of more importance than knowing the engine or serial number," he says. "In these days, the two numbers that every thief knows are on record are the two he will change first if he cannot quickly dispose of a stolen car."

"There are marks put there by varying degrees of usage, that are better than the numerals, but few motorists ever make note of these."

"In addition, as the American Automobile Association, with which this club is affiliated, points out there are thousands of machines licensed yearly under wrong serial and engine numbers. Typographical and other errors will creep into registration cards. It never is too late to check the information the card bears against the bill of sale for your car and it may mean the prevention of confusion later," he explained.

## RESERVATIONS OPPOSED

Great Britain and Other Nations  
Answer U. S. on World Court.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Great Britain and some other European

governments have made their long-delayed replies to the United States proposal to enter the World Court with reservations. The replies are substantially a rejection.

The British reply follows generally the Geneva conference counter reservations to the Senate reservations. It was intimated at the State Department Wednesday. These countries have been declared unacceptable by many Senators and President Coolidge's Kansas City speech was interpreted in that sense.

News of European countries' action coincided with Senate action in sidetracking the resolution of Senator Trammell (Dem., Florida), which sought to rescind United States entry into the court.
