

STATE ROADS IN SOUTHERN PART ARE IMPROVED

Center Portion Highways at Worst, According to Commission.

Gravel and stone roads in southern Indiana are greatly improved, but those in the central portion are at their worst, according to the weekly road survey of the State highway department.

Conditions of roads entering Indianapolis:

No. 29 (Madison, Versailles, Greensburg, Shelbyville, Indianapolis, Kirtland, Logansport, La Porte, Junction of 20 near Michigan line)—Bridges run-around at two miles south of Kirtland. Rough and soft just north of Osgood and for two miles north of Madison.

No. 31 (Covington, Seymour, Columbus, Indianapolis, Peru, Plymouth, South Bend, Michigan line)—Detour between Columbus and Edinburg is rough. Temporary run-around for bridge construction at eleven miles north of Kokomo.

No. 37 (Tell City, English, Paoli, Bedford, Bloomington, Martinsville, Indianapolis)—Temporary bridge at Glenn Valley. Use old bridge at four miles north of Bloomington. Earth slides have partially closed road south of Grangerburg; men at work on new one.

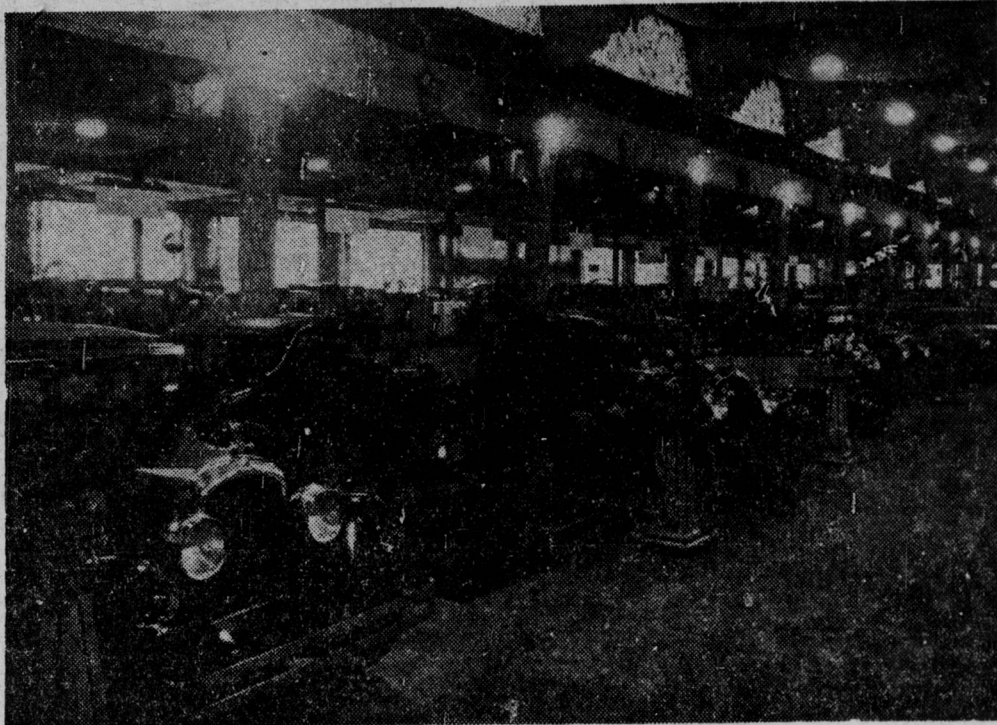
U. S. No. 40 (Illinois line, Terre Haute, Brazil, Indianapolis, Richmond, Ohio line)—Temporary bridge at two miles east of Richmond, and at one mile east of Cambridge City. Approaches to Putnamville overhauled.

U. S. No. 52 (Junction of 41 near Fowler, Lafayette, Lebanon, Indianapolis, Evansville, Brookville, Cincinnati)—Two detours between Lebanon and Lafayette in fair shape. Faring between Morristown and Rushville with detours for local traffic.

No. 3. Building twelve bridges between Marion County line and Morristown; local detour only.

No. 47 (Vincennes, Richland, Worthington, Spencer, Mooresville, Indianapolis, Fortville, Anderson, Muncie, Portland; not maintained to Ohio line)—Subject to inundation at many points between Spencer

SALES HEAD SPEAKS

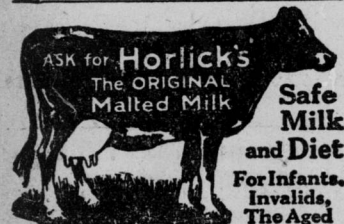
Specialty Advertising Topic at Spink-Arms Gathering.

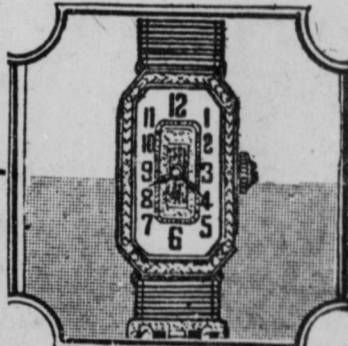

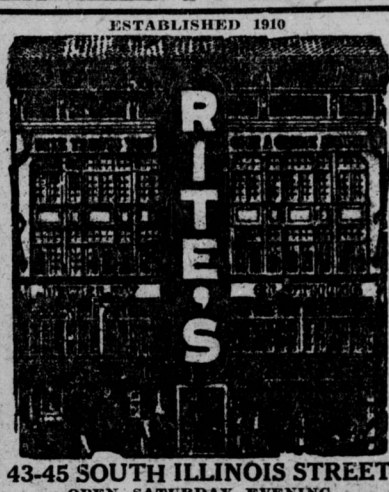
