

POLICE WILL LET "NECKING" PARTIES ALONE AT RACINE

Chief Lays Down Rules for
Couples in Parks—One-
Arm Driving Barred.

RACINE, Wis., April 1.—Spooning is perfectly proper in Racine, according to chief of police H. C. Carson, who said that "necking" parties will be tolerated as long as they live up to the rules for the proper conduct of "necking" parties.

Lovers may wander about arm in arm, or even occupy park benches, the rules state. They must, however, remain within the bounds of propriety.

They may even do their spooning in parked cars, subject of course, to scrutiny of police officers whenever found, to see if they are within the age limit set down by the police.

This limit is a "mature age." It is understood that "mature" means over 16. Chief Baker declares that last summer, police had considerable trouble with couples under that age parking until the wee small hours of the morning. The rule against parking, if the spooners are under that age, will be strictly enforced, the chief states.

Innocent spooning always has been more or less tolerated. Chief Baker declared. Under the new rules it will be tolerated up to midnight. The stroke of twelve is the deadline, however.

There is one thing, however, that the police are strictly against, and that is, one-armed driving.

One arm around a girl is all right, police feel, as long as it is the right arm, the right place, the right time, and everybody concerned is willing.

The time and place, however, are not in a moving car, unless the couple is in the back seat. No mercy will be shown anyone driving, while one arm encircles the waist of a companion.

The word "propriety" in the rules is very flexible. There cannot be set and fast rules outlining what constitutes propriety, so the chief is leaving that question up to the individual officers. If they think everything is nice, and calm, and as it should be,—well, everyone has a right to steal a kiss in the dark.
