

CONSTITUTION CAN NOT BE BARTERED, ASSERTS GILLION

Attacks Ebwbank's Answer in Lawmaker Pay Rehearing.

"The constitution cannot be thus bartered away."

This is the challenge of Attorney General Arthur L. Gilliom in an answer before the Supreme Court in defense of his petition for rehearing of the Legislative pay case. The new brief was brought out by an answer to the rehearing petition urging its denial, which was filed Tuesday by former Supreme Court Judge Louis B. Ebwbank.

Brief Ignored

The Ebwbank answer ignored a ninety-page brief prepared by the attorney general and filed with the rehearing petition.

Ebwbank represents Senator James J. Nejdl in an injunction suit to force State Auditor L. S. Bowman to pay the members of the 1927 Legislature \$10 a day, which they voted themselves, rather than the \$6 which they received and which Gilliom contends is legal. The injunction was refused by the Marion County Circuit Court, judges reversed the decision.

Attacking the Ebwbank answer,

Gilliom's reply in part was as follows: "Appellants' brief is no more than a general denial to the causes of error assigned in the petition for rehearing. The petition contains more than ten printed pages, stating twelve causes for error. Appellants' brief contains less than ten type-written pages and is addressed exclusively to the petition, taking up serially the twelve causes in the petition, and it does no more than to deny that the causes exist. It contains no reasons, authorities or argument, and ignores completely appellee's ninety-page brief.

Already Decided

"It should be said, however, that twelve times appellants' brief reminds the court that by a majority vote the court has already decided the questions presented by the petition. If there ever was a begging of the questions, appellant is doing that begging. Certainly the court decided the case, but the inquiry here is whether the decision is correct."

"Appellant's brief gives one the impression that it is considered either unsafe or else unnecessary for him to discuss the questions."

Pointing out that attention was called to the fact that Legislatures in the past raised officials salaries, the Gilliom answer states that such a suggestion is "out of place."

Reminded of Increases

It continues: "What appellant obviously sought to do was by that means to remind the court that the seventy-fifth session increased the salaries of the judges of the Supreme Court, who are now to decide this case, from \$7,500 to \$10,000 per year. No such increases to the Governor, to the attorney general or to the judges of the Supreme Court afford

any legal or proper reason for sustaining the increase which the members of the Legislature provided unto themselves. The constitution cannot be thus bartered away."

"It is not a question of policy or reciprocation here. It is a question of power under the constitution. The reasonableness of the amount of compensation which the Legislature may fix for its members can never be a question for this court."

Once popular with the girls, Tucker has attracted renewed interest with the revelation of a collection of 100 curls from as many heads buried in a trunk full of relics for

thirty years and treasured as priceless memories of his youth.

Tucker was a student in Westminister college thirty years ago, owned an English phaeton buggy and two horses and spent his Sundays buggy-riding and curl collecting.

Won on Bet

He accumulated the curls as the result of a bet with a fellow student that he could take fifty girls buggy riding on fifty successive days without having the same girl twice. He got so much fun out of the variety that he continued the sport until he acquired 100 curls.

Since then Tucker's horses have died, ninety-four of the 100 girls have married and "jellybeans in noise-making flivvers take girls auto riding who haven't a lock of hair to spare."

One of the girls who contributed a curl to Tucker's collection, still lives in Fulton and remembers the buggy ride.

"Roy was just grand," she said.



Touring Suggestions

1—Belle Isle, Detroit, Michigan. The most beautiful public park and recreation ground in the world. Its 725 acres are surrounded by the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair. Sixteen million dollars worth of improvements have been added to the natural beauty of the park.

2—The Petrified Forest, north of Medora on the Peaceful Valley Ranch in North Dakota. Highway 39.

3—Hahonka Spring, a beautiful spring in the midst of some of the most gorgeous scenery of the Missouri Ozarks. State Highway 5.

4—Ottawa, Kansas, the site of the old trading post of the Ottawa Indians, and the home of Ottawa University, founded by the chief of the Ottawa tribe, John Tecumseh Jones. Ottawa is an Indian name meaning "to trade." State Highway 16.

7—Penai Rock towers over the banks of the Wisconsin River. An object of outstanding natural beauty. On Wisconsin Highways 80 and 21.

8—The Lumberjack Cabin, made famous by Gene Stratton Porter's stories, located in a picturesque spot on the banks of Sylvan Lake, Elks Point Road, south of Rome City, Indiana.

9—The South Dakota State Game Preserve, consisting of over 61,000 acres between Hermosa and Custer. The preserve is well stocked with buffalo, elk, deer, antelope and other native game. State Highway 36.
