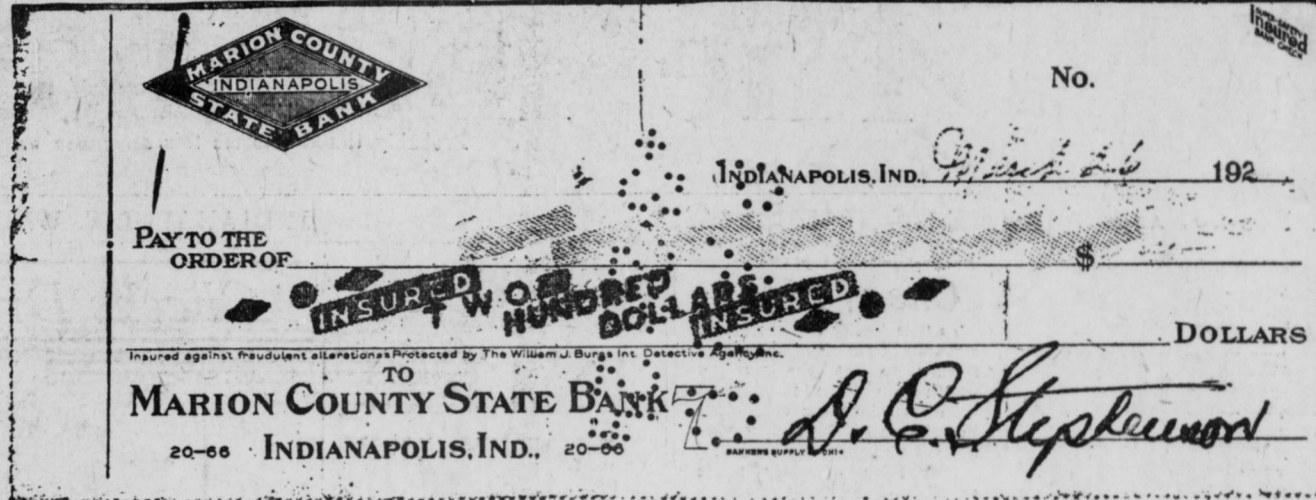
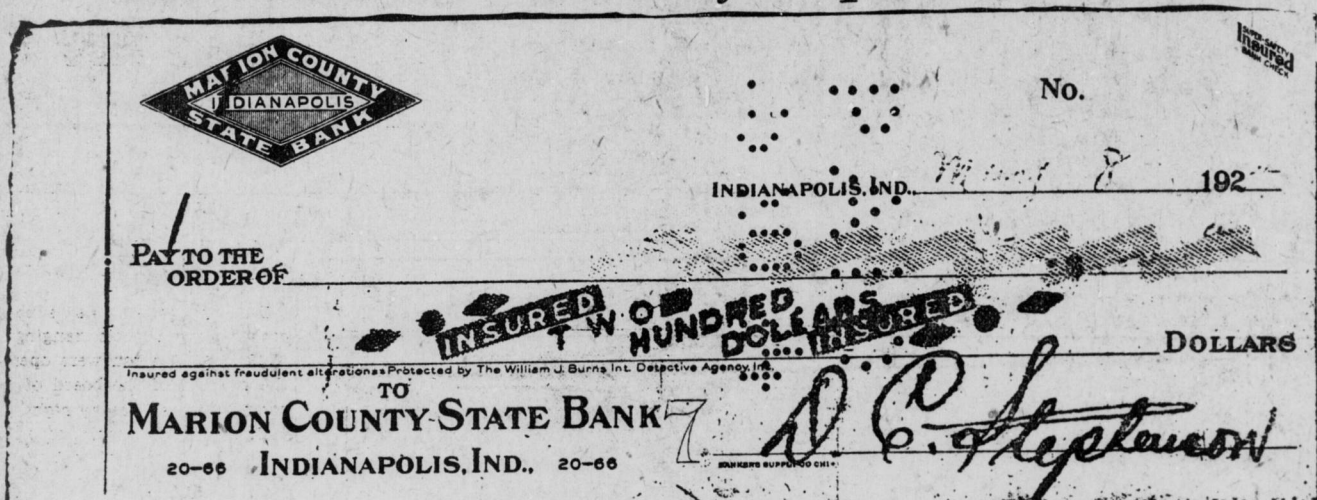

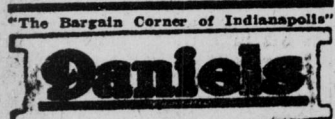

GRAY AND RUTH TO SEEK STAY

Attorneys Ready to Ask Execution Delay.

NEW YORK, July 13.—Attorneys for Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray, sentenced to death for the murder of Albert Snyder, today planned to ask an extension of time for argument of appeals.

Under the New York law, appeals must be argued within three months of time of sentence. The three months expires Aug. 17, but the court of appeals will adjourn for vacation in a few days and will not meet again until fall.

Question whether an extension of time can be granted when the court is not in session has been raised, and the attorneys hope to obtain a definite ruling.

VETERANS RUSH HINES' BUREAU

War Risk Insurance Business Snows Office Under.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, director of the United States veterans bureau, announced today that the exact amount of war risk insurance reinstated and converted by veterans prior to July 2, cannot be given yet as all applications have not been received from the regional offices and hospitals.

General Hines estimated that the applications for conversion of year-

ly renewable term insurance during the month of June alone will run between 175,000 and 200,000.

General Hines called attention to the fact that the enormous volume of applications received has passed all expectations.

Applications are being acted upon in the order in which they are received in the bureau.

The ex-service man who applied for his insurance at the last minute, cannot expect to receive his converted policy for some time. For this reason, General Hines stated, all applicants are urged to continue payments of their premiums even though they have not yet received their policies.

General Hines complimented all employees who have worked in this drive and stated that although the regular personnel in central office had been augmented by temporary employees, the employees of the insurance division and others in central office have worked night and day in an effort to place the work on a current basis.

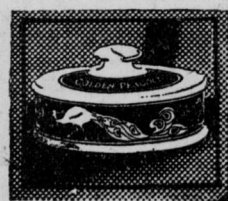
