


WASHINGTON, July 13.—Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, director of the United States veterans bureau announced today that the exact amount of war risk insurance reinstated and converted by veterans prior to July 2, cannot be given yet as all applications have not been received from the regional offices and hospitals.

General Hines estimated that the applications for conversion of year-

ly renewable term insurance during the month of June alone will run between 175,000
