

550 WILL MEET LINDBERGH AT BANQUET AUG. 9

Business Leaders Will Be Invited to Columbia Club Dinner.

Arrangements are being made for 550 Indianapolis business men and manufacturers to attend the Lindbergh banquet at the Columbia Club Aug. 9.

Men only will be invited, the banquet committee, headed by Norman A. Perry of the Indianapolis Power and Light Company, decided.

Civic organizations will make up lists of business men and civic leaders. Invitations will be mailed out and when 550 acceptances have been received, the lists will be closed. The tickets are \$5 each.

Want Business Heads

Request was made by the Guggenheim Foundation, sponsoring the Lindbergh tour, that men only attend the banquet in order that as many business men as possible might attend.

Women and children will be given opportunity to hear Lindbergh at the mass meeting in the afternoon, probably at the Fair Grounds coliseum.

At the request of the Guggenheim Foundation, the mass meeting committee, headed by Postmaster Robert H. Bryson, is making arrangements for a special section for school children.

Committee Named

Bryson's committee will be A. Kiefer Meyer, Guy A. Wainwright, Howard M. Gay, George B. Wellbaum, P. H. Wolford, A. D. Hitz and County Auditor Harry Dunn.

Walter T. Boyer announced that the automobile committee will be named soon.

It has been estimated that 200,000 people from outside Indianapolis will be in the city to see Lindbergh.

Excursion schedules with special railroad and interurban rates to bring crowds here for the flier's reception were considered at a meeting of the excursion committee at Chamber of Commerce. The body is composed of Ed. Hunter, chairman, and a number of railroad, traction and newspaper men.

Round trip tickets at a one-way fare is the aim of the committee.

MAPLE 'KNEW' OF HORSE DEAL

Former Klan Leader Says Steve Told Him.

An echo of the Jackson-Stephenson \$2,500 horse deal came from Muncie today.

Clell Maple, manufacturer, and former Klan leader, gave the Muncie Press an affidavit declaring that D. C. Stephenson during the summer of 1923 told him of having bought a horse from Governor Ed Jackson which with equipment cost him \$2,500.

Jackson has offered this as an explanation of the Stephenson check to him. Stephenson said the check was a campaign contribution.

Maple was positive that the conversation was during the summer of 1923, asserting that it took place while he and Stephenson were on the way to a Klan meeting in a field near Muncie.

His fixing of the date during the summer was regarded as important in view of the fact that the check to Jackson from Stephenson was dated Sept. 12, 1923.

ACTING SCHOOL HEAD WON'T RENAME SELF

Thornton Will Leave Matter in the Hands of New Chief.

Joseph F. Thornton, acting school superintendent, is facing an embarrassing problem.

As acting superintendent, Thornton failed to renominate himself as assistant superintendent, the position he held before being named acting superintendent upon the dismissal recently of E. U. Graff.

School commissioners, after naming Charles F. Miller, State superintendent of public instruction, Indianapolis superintendent, found they had no power to give Thornton his old position back until he had renominated himself and submitted his name for the board's approval.

Thornton indicated today he would not do this but would leave the matter in the hands of the new superintendent when he assumes office.

THREAT CHARGE COSTS COP JOB

Chief Suspends Patrolman; Drew Gun, Report.

Patrolman John W. Mullin, 119 W.

Twenty-eighth St., inspector of detectives during the Shank administration, was suspended today by Police Chief Claude F. Johnson, who charged improper use of firearms.

Johnson said a complaint was received and investigated, regarding Mullin's alleged threat to shoot Ellsworth Maxwell, 15, of Forty-sixth St. and Millersville Rd., who ran while being questioned by the officer.

Children are said to have been fooling motorists, with a tire they placed in the road with a rope tied to it. Mullin stopped and the boys ran.

The Maxwell boy was called from the porch of his home for question-

ing. Johnson said he learned, frightened, the boy started to run, his gun and threatened to shoot.

Mullin has been a member of the department for twenty-four years, and once was commended for bravery in the capture of two hold-up men.

Police say that the tire ruse is frequently used by hold-up men to cause motorists to stop and then rob them. Mullin could not be reached for a statement.

MRS. HARcourt GIVEN TAX REFUND OF \$571

Payment Made in Accordance With Supreme Court Ruling.

Refund of \$571.34 for taxes illegally collected in 1919, 1920 and 1921 was allowed Tuesday to Mrs. Mary E. Harcourt, administratrix of John R. Harcourt's estate, by Harry Dunn, county auditor. The refund included interest.

This amount must be deducted, Dunn said, from the money Washington township receives from the county for school operation, road building and other township activities.

No further claims will be allowed until provision is made for funds, Dunn said.

The Harcourt claim was first filed in Marion County Circuit Court where Judge Harry O. Chamberlain approved it. The Indiana Supreme Court upheld the claim in March.


