The committee in charge of arrangements is composed of Bert E. Kimmell, Mrs. Ola Miley and Katherine Welsbach.

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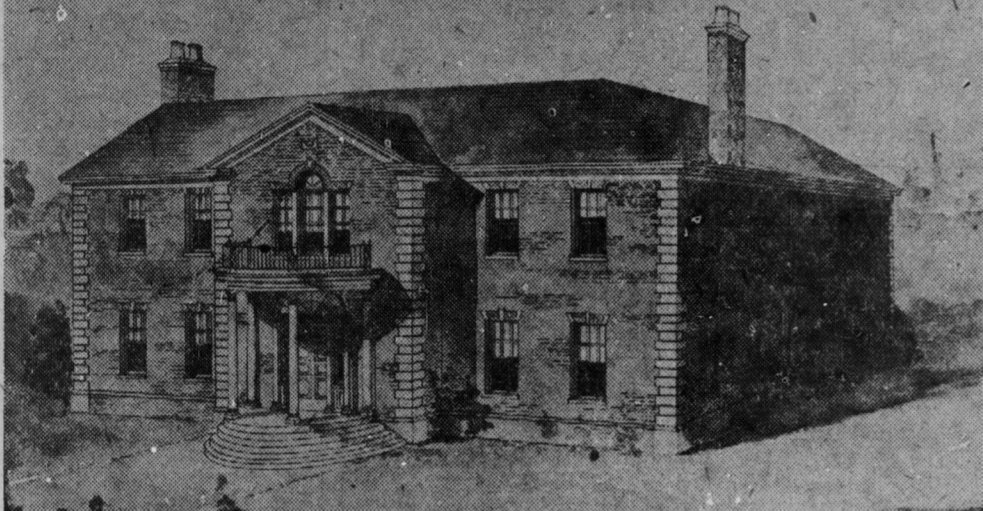

"The red tassel, symbolic of jollity and fun-making within the Mystic Order of Veiled Prophets of the Enchanted Realm, set upon black fez, emblematic of sympathy, will hold sway at the meeting," Past Monarch Raymond F. Murray, president of the State organization, declared.

Plans for the proposed \$50,000 boys' dormitory at the Indiana Masonic Home will be discussed at the meeting. Architects' drawings have been prepared for the building which will be erected by the ten State Grottoes.

PRESS EQUALITY IS WON AT CONFERENCE

Exclusive Government Agency News Dealt Death Blow.

GENEVA, Aug. 26.—After general discussion of property right in news, the International Press conference, convened here under the auspices of the League of Nations, was unanimous today in accepting the principle first advanced here by the United Press that governmental news should never become the exclusive property of anyone.

The conference instructed its general committee, of which Karl A. Bickel, representing the United Press is the American member, to prepare a project embodying the foregoing viewpoint.

The bandits left with money from the sale and \$10 from the cash register.
