Radio will be represented at the Indiana State fair. There is to be an exhibit in the Manufacturers' Bldg. Keep this in mind when at the fairgrounds and be sure to see it.

Anyone who happens to be in New York between Sept. 19 and 24, can consider himself fortunate, as that is the time of the fourth annual Radio World's Fair, at the Madison Square Garden.

This is expected to far surpass former shows in displays and attendance. The Radio Industries banquet at the Hotel Astor, Sept. 21 will be put on the air by the most extensive hook-up ever employed. Fifty-nine stations have signified their intention of joining this chain and others are expected to be added before the time arrives.

Some radio stations will grant their entertainers and attendants a holiday today, while others have planned special Labor day features.

Among the latter will be some stations affiliated with WEAF. These will broadcast an address by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, at 5 p.m. The National Concert Orchestra will play selections in keeping with the occasion, prior and subsequent to the day.

Another to give recognition to the day will be KOA, Denver, which claims to have been the first broadcaster to arrange a Labor Day program, three years ago. Its third program will consist of a talk by Earl R. Hoage, president of the Colorado State Federation of Labor, and a musical program provided by union players. 
