

NEW RULES IN STATE'S PARKS GO IN EFFECT

State Commission Also Announces Abandoned Oil Well Regulations.

New rules governing use of State parks and the plugging of abandoned gas and oil wells were announced by the conservation department today, following approval by the Governor.

The park regulations deal with injury to property, birds, animals, the use of firearms, presence of dogs, vending, advertising, admission fees, camps, fires, motor vehicles, horse-back riding and bathing.

The gas and oil well rule requires plugging of all abandoned wells, the State geologist decided whether or not they have been abandoned in case of controversy.

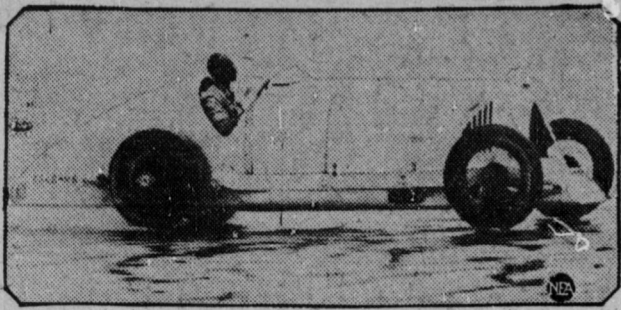
Bans Defacing Property

Following are the park rules in detail:

"No person shall injure, destroy, remove, mutilate or deface any building, structure, sign, rock, tree, shrub, vine or property whatever, nor pick any flowers, nor take, kill, injure, pursue, hunt or molest or rifle the nest of any bird or the den, nest or abode of any wild animal.

"The carrying or possession of a gun or firearm is prohibited. Dogs, except those on leash, shall not be

taken or allowed to go into any such park or place.

"No person shall sell, vend, peddle, distribute, or deliver any merchandise or property whatever, except with the express permission of the department of conservation. The placing or distribution of advertisements or advertising matter of any character is prohibited, except with the express permission of said department.

Fee For Campers

"No camp or tent shall be located except in such area or place as may be specially provided therefor by the department of conservation. For each tent so located there shall be paid to the department of conservation a fee of 25 cents for each twenty-four hours or fraction thereof. Camps shall be kept clean and sanitary. Trash, waste, garbage or refuse shall not be thrown or scattered upon the grounds nor thrown in any stream or body of water, but

shall be placed in baskets or receptacles provided therefor. No camp fires shall be built except in places provided and designated by said department for that purpose.

"No person shall build or start any fire whatever, except a campfire as above provided for cooking, warmth or smudge. All campfires shall be entirely extinguished immediately after use. No person shall carelessly, negligently or maliciously start any fire. Lighted matches, cigarettes, cigars, or other articles afire shall be thoroughly extinguished before being thrown away.

Speed Limit Is Fixed

"No person shall run or operate any motor vehicle at a greater rate of speed than fifteen miles per hour, nor drive, nor park such motor vehicle at any place except where provided therefor by said department.

No person shall ride, drive or hitch any horse except at such places as may be permitted or provided therefor by said department.

"No person shall bathe in or use any bathing beach except at such places and times as may be permitted or provided therefor by said department. Bathing beaches may be closed to the public and bathing therein prohibited at any time when, in the opinion of park authorities, bathing therein may be dangerous.

"The two new regulations are now a part of the conservation law enacted March 11, 1919. The law empowered the commission, when the necessity arose, to draft additional regulations, with the consent of the Governor, that will better enable the department to function to the best interests of the people generally."

OUTLINE CLINIC COURSE

Lectures to Be Given at Central State Hospital.

The twenty-eighth annual program of clinical lectures to be given at the pathological department of Central State Hospital has been issued by Superintendent Max A. Bahr.

Courses are designed largely for students at Indiana University Medical School, but also are open to practitioners. A special course of clinical lectures for members of the legal profession and law students has also been arranged.

The entire program includes courses in psychopathology, psychiatry, neurology, neuropathology, social psychiatry and abnormal psychology.

RAIN INSURANCE FIRMS HIT BY DAMP SUMMER

Join Concessionaires' Ranks in Wails Over Business This Year.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Inclement weather during the summer has resulted in a loss of trade representing millions of dollars to concessionaires at seashore resorts, also in a loss of thousands of dollars to companies writing rain insurance.

This type of business, which, for the first time in years was beginning to make money for the insurance companies at the beginning of the season, has again resulted in a loss during July and August of more than \$200,000.

Rain insurance policies usually are taken out to cover a probable loss during a carnival, fair, or, in fact, anything that may suffer as

the result of rain. There are cases on record of churches obtaining rain insurance, which also includes snow, to cover a probable loss of revenue from collections on Easter Sunday or other special church holidays.

Three Hours Minimum

The amount of insurance granted is based by the companies on previous experience as to the income and expenses, which must be proved before the policy is issued. The policy usually is written against a hazard of one-tenth or two-tenths of an inch of rain falling within a specified number of hours. The hours covered must be consecutive and a specific amount of insurance written for each period covered.

Insurance companies have set three hours as the minimum for which a policy may be obtained, with a maximum of twelve hours.

The policy must be taken for at least 50 per cent of the expected loss. For example, a man obtains a policy to cover some event during which he expects to make \$5,000 as shown by his previous experience. However, he only wants to be insured for \$2,500 because of the lower premium.

Even Break Given

During the hours that the policy is in effect if the rain should fall

one-tenth of an inch, as reported by the official weather observer in that district, the insurance company will pay the difference between what he has made during that time and \$2,500, the amount shown on the face of the policy.

The rates for rain insurance vary according to the month in which it is issued. It has been proved by experience that after 4 p. m. in the month of July the greatest precipitation is to be expected, therefore the rates at this time of the year are higher than in October. With weather forecasting perfected to the point that it is today, the insurance companies demand that rain insurance be obtained seven days before the event takes place. This gives the insurer and the insured an even chance in the breaks of the weather.

263 MILES; NO STOP

Longest Run Is Made by Train on English Road.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—The longest non-stop run made by any train in the world is in the comparatively small country of Great Britain. The London & Northwestern Flying Dutchman, on its trip to Edinburgh makes only one stop at Newcastle, 263 miles from London.

FISH DIE IN STREAMS

State Probes Epidemics in Two Rivers.

An epidemic of dead fish in White and Mississinewa rivers is being investigated by the fish and game division of the State conservation department, Superintendent George N. Mannfeld announced today. Following complaints of residents along the river banks at Muncie, Marion, Hartford City and Anderson, he also brought the matter to the attention of the State health department.

Anderson citizens claim that dozens of dead fish have entered White river through Buck creek.

A complete investigation will be made and if necessary prosecutions for stream pollutions may follow, Mannfeld declared.

Killing of fish is attributed largely to poisonous industrial waste from the strawboard and other mills along the streams.
