

# WEATHER HARD ON SOFT ROAD BEDS IN STATE

Heavy Hauling Restrictions  
Posted by Highway  
Commission.

Continued rains and warm weather throughout the State have softened unpaved roads of the highway system and made heavy hauling restrictions necessary, the weekly bulletin of the State Highway Department reads today.

Director John D. Williams stated that maintenance crews are at work, however, and roads will be scraped and smoothed preparatory to a freeze. Southern localities are experiencing flood waters and in several instances portions of the roads are inundated, the bulletin states. White River is over the highway on Rd. 50, at Medora. Traffic is now routed via Brownstown, Salem and Paoli, while the high waters prevail. Water also covers Rd. 67 for some distance near Gosport, affecting Indianapolis to Spencer traffic. A good detour here is still used.

Surface conditions, detours and bridge run-arounds are set forth in the bulletin as follows:

- No. 1—Good stone surface from Rd. 50 to four miles north of Milan; avoid to Rd. 44.
- No. 2—Detour around grading three miles north of Milan.
- No. 3—Drive carefully past workmen on Hanging Rock Hill, and at eight miles, ten miles and fourteen miles north of Madison.
- No. 4—Run-around via Mt. Etna for bridge construction. In case of high water or ice a detour will be made at one-fourth mile west of Brimfield.
- No. 5—One-half mile detour around Culver due to construction.
- No. 6—U. S. No. 20—New fills over sink holes east of La Grange are soft and rutted.
- No. 7—U. S. No. 24—Detour just east of Huntington until city makes street connection with new pavement.
- No. 8—U. S. No. 27—Bridge run-around south of Portland. Detour from Fountain City to Lynn. Bridge run-around three miles north of Richmond. Detour 2.1 miles south of Richmond.
- No. 9—Run-around just north of intersection of Rds. 28 and 32. Good three-mile detour while widening road for two miles north of Burlington. Bridge run-around at five miles north of Knox. Detour from two miles north of La Porte to junction of Rd. 20.
- No. 10—U. S. No. 35—Bridge run-around two miles east of Schererville. Short detour in Plymouth.
- No. 11—U. S. No. 31—When new grade at eleven miles north of Kokomo is soft, traffic use the temporary run-around. Bridge run-around one mile north of Peru.
- No. 12—Bridge run-around one and one-

No. 35—Narrow road between Corydon and Palmyra.  
No. 36—Short detour at Abner's Creek, east of Danville. Bridge run-around just south of Dyer.  
No. 37—Drive carefully past workmen south of Grantshurg, one-way traffic.  
No. 38—Detour six miles south of Frankfort.  
No. 39—Gravel approaches to several new bridges between Vincennes and Sullivan. Bridge run-around just south of Lottford. Detour, St. John to Dyer.  
No. 40—Detour four miles north of Crawfordsville. Bridge run-around two and one-half miles north of Pomroy.  
No. 41—Widening road between Dale and Huntington; traffic drive carefully.  
No. 42—Bridge run-around three and one-half miles east of Nashville. Drive slowly at bridge run-around five miles west of Elizabethtown.  
No. 43—Water over road at Medora; detour marked. Bridge run-around west of Seymour.  
No. 44—Drive carefully northwest of Morristown.  
No. 45—Bridge run-around six and one-half miles east of Paoli. Closed for construction between West Baden and Paoli. Detour poor. During thaw, heavy loading is restricted between Paoli and Salem. Bad earth surface between Salem and Scottsburg. Temporary one-way bridge between Madison and Vevay.  
No. 46—Ferry White River at Rogers, with two miles earth road across river bottom between Rogers and Sandy Hook. Detour via Monroe City and Wheatland.  
No. 47—Detour south of Washington. account bridge construction and bridge run-around three miles north of Washington.  
No. 48—New pavement is open on Rd.

62 between Corydon and New Albany.  
No. 49—Bridge run-around five miles north of Mt. Vernon.  
No. 50—Impassable between Newburg and Hartford with no detour. Through traffic avoid 66 and Evansville-Rockport traffic route via Rds. 45 and 62 until further notice.  
No. 51—Bridge run-around one and four-tenths miles south of Bruceville. Bridge run-around four miles east of Gosport.  
No. 52—Under construction from West Baden and French Lick to Paoli. There is a local detour between West Baden and Paoli, but through traffic had best route from Paoli over 37 and 50 via Mitchell.
